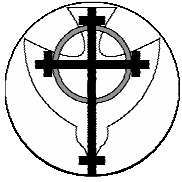

Welcome

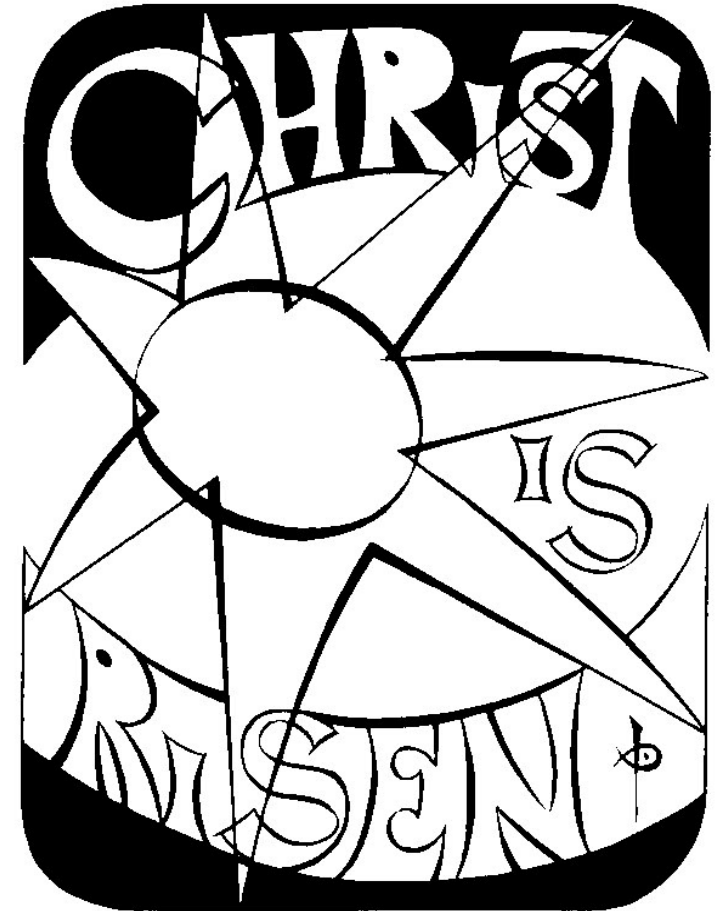

Holy Communion Practice

- The Lord's Supper is celebrated at this congregation in the confession and glad confidence that, as He says, our Lord gives into our mouths not only bread and wine, but His very Body and Blood to eat and to drink for the forgiveness of sins and to strengthen our union with Him and with one another. In preparation for receiving this blessed Sacrament, you may refer to Martin Luther's "Christian Questions with Their Answers" found on pages 329-330 in *LSB*.
- Communicants at this altar are to be in full confessional fellowship with the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. Any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a confession differing from that of this congregation and the LCMS are asked, out of love and Christian responsibility, to refrain from partaking with us this morning. If you have any questions regarding Holy Communion, you are invited and encouraged to speak with the pastor before or after the Service.

Our Mission Statement

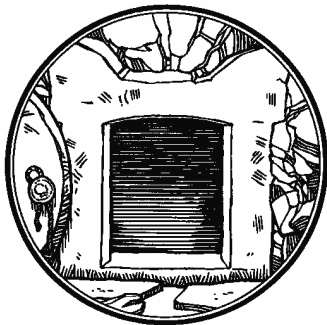

The Service of Preparation

(Even with the celebratory spirit of this day, silence should still be observed upon entering the nave to allow all the opportunity to prayerfully prepare for the presence of the Lord and the reception of His gifts)

Preparatory Prayer

Lord, I love the habitation of Your house and the place where Your glory dwells. In the multitude of Your tender mercies prepare my heart that I may enter Your house to worship and confess Your holy name; through Jesus Christ, my God and Lord. Amen.

The Prelude and Ringing of the Bells

(At the Ringing of the Bells, the congregation stands and faces the processional cross for the Call to Worship, Easter Proclamation, and Procession. It is customary to continue facing the cross as it is processed in and to bow your head and make the sign of the cross in reverence and admiration to the Lord as it passes your pew. The same applies for the recessional as Service concludes.)

The Call to Worship

- P** Christians, to the Paschal Victim offer your thankful praises!
- C** **The Lamb the sheep has ransomed: Christ, who only is sinless, reconciling sinners to the Father.**
- P** Death and life have contended in that combat stupendous:
- C** **The Prince of Life, who died, reigns immortal.**
- P** “Speak, Mary, declaring what you saw when wayfaring.”
- C** **“The tomb of Christ, who is living, the glory of Jesus’ resurrection;**
- P** Bright angels attesting, the shroud and napkin resting.
- C** **My Lord, my hope, is arisen; to Galilee He goes before you.”**
- P** Christ indeed from death is risen, our new life obtaining.
- C** **Have mercy, victor King, ever reigning! Amen. Alleluia!**

From Martin Luther’s Sermon for The Resurrection of Our Lord John 20:1-18

In the Gospel of John, Christ tells Mary Magdalene of the benefit and use of His Death and Resurrection still more plainly, when He says: “But go unto my brethren, and say to them, ‘I ascend unto My Father and your Father, and My God and your God’” (John 20:17). This is one of the great and comforting passages upon which we can venture, and of which we dare boast. As if Christ had said: “Go hence, Mary, and say to my disciples who have deserted Me on the field of battle, and who have well merited punishment and eternal condemnation, that My Resurrection has taken place for their benefit; that is, by My Resurrection I have brought it to pass that My Father is their Father, and My God is their God. These are few words and very short; but they contain a great thought, namely, that we have as great a confidence and refuge in God as Christ His Son Himself has. Who can grasp such exceeding joy, unless one speaks of himself when he says a poor, corrupt sinner can and may call God his Father and his God, just like Christ Himself does?”

The author of the Epistle to the Hebrews has grasped the words of Ps. 22:23 and taken them well to heart, when he says of Christ: “For which cause he is not ashamed to call them brethren, saying, I will declare thy name unto my brethren, in the midst of the congregation will I sing thy praise” (Heb 2:11-12). If any worldly lord were to condescend so low as to say to a thief, or a murderer or to a low French character, “Thou art my brother”; that would be a great thing and everyone would be amazed at it; but that this King, who in his glory sits at the right hand of God, his Father, says to a poor sinner: “Thou art my brother”; that no one takes to heart, no one receives it in earnest, and yet on that hangs our highest comfort and courage against sin, death, Satan, hell, law, and against all misfortune, both of the body and of the soul.

Before receiving the Sacrament:

Dear Savior, at Your gracious invitation I come to Your table to eat and drink Your holy body and blood. Let me find favor in Your eyes to receive this holy Sacrament in faith for the salvation of my soul and to the glory of Your holy name; for You live and reign with the Father and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.

Thanksgiving after receiving the Sacrament:

Almighty and everlasting God, I thank and praise You for feeding me the life-giving body and blood of Your beloved Son, Jesus Christ. Send Your Holy Spirit that, having with my mouth received the holy Sacrament, I may by faith obtain and eternally enjoy Your divine grace, the forgiveness of sins, unity with Christ, and life eternal; through Jesus Christ, my Lord. Amen.

³For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁴that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, ⁵and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. ⁶Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. ⁷Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. ⁸Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. ⁹For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. ¹⁰But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain.
