From the Desk of Pastor Messer "Divine Humility and Love"

Not a palace, but a stable. Not a cushioned crib, but a feeding trough for animals (a manger). Not in a rich powerful city, but in lowly Bethlehem. Not to rich, powerful, royal, and influential parents, but to a simple carpenter and lowly maiden. Not with great fanfare, pomp, and circumstance, but while the world slept unaware—the only announcement made by the angels to shepherds in the fields. This is how the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity made His entrance into our flesh in order to bear our sins and be our Savior. It is nothing short of amazing! Hearing the remarkable details of our Lord's birth never gets old, which is why the Church continues to sing, "Marvel now, O heav'n and earth, that the Lord chose such a birth" ("Savior of the Nations, Come" - LSB 332, st. 1).

Marvel, indeed! God is born a baby! The Eternal Word of the Father, the very Creator of all things, the One who spoke creation into existence, descends from heaven to be born into His creation. In Mary's arms, nursing from her breasts, is God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God. He humbles Himself to assume our human flesh and become dependent upon the milk of His mother and the care of his earthly father, even while He continues to hold the entire universe in His tiny little hands. If this does not cause you to marvel, nothing will!

The Divine Humility of our Lord and Savior, Jesus the Christ, is truly a marvelous thing to behold. The holy angels are taken aback by it and long to delve into what they perceive to be the mystery of mysteries. They have seen the One who lies seemingly helpless in a manger in all His glory. They know Who this Baby named Jesus really is, and it amazes them to see Him in this manner. Not only that, but they know the reason God takes on human flesh and is born into this dead and dying world, namely to save sinful humanity, and they cannot help but sing His praises. As they gaze upon Almighty God, their Lord and Master, wrapped in swaddling cloths and lying in a dirty, feeding trough, they marvel not only at His Divine Humility, but at His Divine Love for sinful mankind, for it is that Divine Love which moved Him to subject Himself to such humility.

The Divine Humility and Love we see on display in Bethlehem on that Holy Night long ago continued to be exemplified in our Lord Jesus throughout His salvific pilgrimage to our sinful world. He did not come seeking honor and fame, but to serve and love God and neighbor completely and perfectly in our place. He did not come to



conquer the world and establish a mighty earthly empire, but to do battle with, and defeat, sin, death, and the devil on our behalf. He did not come to be served, but to serve. The One who chose to be born in such low estate lived in poverty throughout His time here, relying upon His Father to provide for His every need. He had no place to lay His head. He had no accumulation of material possessions. There was nothing about His appearance that would draw people to Him. In short, the Divine Humility we witness at His birth continued throughout His earthly life.

Of course, the ultimate picture of our Lord's Divine Humility and Love is seen in Jerusalem thirty-some years after His ignoble birth. We see it when He washes the feet of His disciples. We see it when He sweats blood while praying in the Garden of Gethsemane, submitting to His Father's will. We see it when He submits to being arrested. We see it when He is spit upon, beaten, mocked, and severely flogged. We see it in His silence before Caiaphas and Pilate. We see it when He carries His own cross to Golgotha outside the city gates. We see it when He allows Simon of Cyrene to assist Him in carrying His cross. We see it when the nails are driven through His hands and feet. We see it when He hangs on that cruel instrument of torture, gasping for air. We hear it in the Words He utters from the cross, and we see it when He takes His last breath and dies.

And it's all amazing; it's all something to most definitely marvel over, for this is God Himself, Incarnate in human flesh, Who is born in such low estate, lives in such poverty, and dies such a heinous death. It becomes all the more amazing (if it's possible to ponder anything more amazing than God living and dying as a Man) when we consider that He did it all for us—for you, for me. He humbled Himself and assumed human flesh to live as your substitute; to hunger and thirst as you hunger and thirst; to be tempted as you are tempted; to experience pain and suffering as you experience pain and suffering; to be mocked and suffer injustice as you are mocked and suffer injustice; to even suffer death as you suffer death. All of it because He loves you with a Divine Love beyond our human comprehension. All of it to rescue you from the eternity you deserve because of your sins. All of it to win for you forgiveness, life, and salvation. All of it because He desires that you spend eternity with Him in perfect peace, comfort, and joy.

Dearly beloved, as we enter the holy season of Advent and make our way to Bethlehem to celebrate our Savior's birth, let us take our cue from the holy angels and ponder the mystery of our Lord's Incarnation. Let us follow the example of the Blessed Virgin Mary and treasure this mystery in our hearts, pondering with great wonder and joy the reason our God humbled Himself to be born into this sinful world in our human flesh. He came to live and die for you, dear friends, each and every one of you. In Divine Humility and Love, He came to save you by living the life you fail to live and by dying the death you deserve to die for your sins. This is the true "reason for the season," the true meaning of Christmas.

But, let us not stop at pondering and treasuring up in our hearts this great mystery, as if this was all just some bygone story to be cherished, remembered, and passed on to others. This is no legend or fairy tale or epic saga to warm our hearts and lift our spirits as we roast chestnuts around the fire. This is no "Hallmark Special" to talk about as we sip our eggnog and open presents. Our Lord lives! His Divine Humility and Love is still on full display and still as active today as it was two millennia ago, for the same God who assumed human flesh and was born of the Virgin Mary, the same God who lived to serve and love God and neighbor, the same God who allowed Himself to be treated shamefully and put to death, continues to come to us in Divine Humility and Love as we gather in His Name for Divine Service. It should not surprise us that He makes no flashy appearance in our midst, but instead comes among us humbly and hiddenly, wrapped in the swaddling cloths of His Holy Word and Sacraments. That's His way. And He comes to us in Divine Humility and Love to deliver the forgiveness, life, and salvation He accomplished for us. This, too, is the meaning of Christmas.

"Marvel now, O heav'n and earth, that the Lord chose such a birth." Yes, marvel away at that! But, marvel, too, that our Lord chooses to continue to meet us in His Church in Divine Humility and Love to deliver to us His Divine Gifts. Marvel and come, at His gracious invitation, to receive His Gifts and to be filled with His Divine Humility and Love!

Service of Lessons and Carols

Our Service of Lessons and Carols will take place on Christmas Eve at 7:00 p.m. This is a beautiful and popular Service which puts before us the account of our Lord's Holy Birth through Holy Scripture and Hymnody (including many beloved Christmas Carols), and the preaching of the Holy Gospel, and includes the lighting of the Christ Candle and the singing of Silent Night and the Christmas Prayer by candlelight.

Midnight Mass

A Homily Upon Midnight Mass

Salem Lutheran (Gretna, LA)
24 December Anno + Domini 2009
Text: Luke 2:1-20 (Is. 9:2-7; Tit. 2:11-14)

In the name of + Jesus. Amen.

In these last days, we take light for granted. With the flip of a switch, our formerly dark world is bathed in light. And in that light, we can carry on at night as though it were day. And we don't even think anything of it.

In this sense, the world of the 8th century BC prophet Isaiah was different than ours. He wrote of "walking in darkness," and people knew exactly what that meant. Walking in the darkness could be annoying, or even dangerous. Darkness hides obstacles that we can trip on, or even bandits and robbers who can do us violence. Darkness symbolizes ignorance, fear, sin, and death itself.

The first thing God created was light, and light is mentioned in the last chapter of the Bible as well – as that new and perfect world will be so glorious and filled with light that there will be no need for sun or moon.

But caught in the middle of the two paradises: the golden age of the past, and the glorious age of the future – we do have to contend with darkness – in this world and in our hearts.

"The people who walked in darkness," prophesies Isaiah, "have seen a great light. Those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shined."

The darkness of sin and of a broken world has been interrupted and conquered by the coming of the Light of the World, our Lord Jesus Christ, born under the light of a star that was a sign to the far-flung peoples of this dark world, the Word of God made flesh, whose Word that ordered "Let there be light" brought all things into being.

While the shepherds in the fields near Bethlehem went about their routine work in the dark, protecting their sheep from predators and watching over them lest they wander away into the gloom, a light shined on them as well: "An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with fear." But this angel, bathed in light, bid them: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people."

The darkness was obliterated and cast aside by the luminous glory of the Lord. And the angel's good news was nothing other than this: "For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord." And the hosts of heaven gloriously appeared in this heavenly light, singing even with us twenty centuries later, as we join them in their heavenly liturgy: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom He is pleased!"

The coming of Jesus dispelled the darkness of sin and of ignorance, making the glory of the Lord a light to be shared with men and by men, a lamp to be put on a stand, so that all may see and give glory to God! The light of the Gospel enlightens our darkened hearts and dimly burning wicks of faith by bathing us in the glorious

light of the good news of the forgiveness of sins, of peace with God, of the restoration of man before His Lord, of God's image glowing in the face of Jesus, of the coming of the Creator into the fallen world in order to create a new and greater world! And this, dear friends, is all for you – for as the holy prophet proclaims: "For to us a child is born, to us a Son is given," and the angel quotes this Word of God to the shepherds: "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David, a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

The darkness of the Old Testament's waiting for the Savior has been chased away by the light of the New Testament in the blood of this very fleshly Savior, who is Christ the Lord.

*This is the Christ, our God most high,
Who hears your sad and bitter cry;
He will Himself your Savior be
From all your sins to set you free.*

For this Light of the world doesn't merely illuminate our lives so that business as usual can go on after hours. Jesus is not simply a light that keeps us from stubbing our toes in the middle of the night. He is the Light that illuminates our sins so that we can repent, whose Light then shines on us the warm glow of the love of God, whose mercy enlightens us and fills us with the Holy Spirit, praying for us and with us, calling us and empowering us to holiness, and using us to share this light with "them that sit in darkness and the shadow of death."

"For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation for all people," says the holy apostle, "training us to renounce ungodliness and worldly passions, and to live self-controlled, upright and godly lives in the present age, waiting for our blessed hope, the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior Jesus Christ."

The Light of Christ is the very source of all light, the Word that first uttered: "Let there be light." And it is He who implores us to let our light shine before men, that they too might be illuminated by the Gospel. And even as Christians around the world this holy night ignite candles off of the lit candles of their neighbors, whose flame originates from the Christ candle stationed near the baptismal font, we thank and praise God for providing the true Light to us, as a free gift, as an act of mercy and grace.

For to us a child is born, "who gave Himself for us to redeem us from all lawlessness and to purify for Himself a people for His own possession who are zealous for good works."

Dear Christians, you are no longer terrorized by darkness. You are no longer held hostage to evil that lurks in the darkness. For on that silent night, that holy night, God Himself took flesh to redeem you, forgive your sins, enlighten your darkness, and lead you to a bright and shining eternal future.

*Silent night. Holy night.
Son of God, love's pure light.
Radiant beams from Thy holy face
With the dawn of redeeming grace.
Jesus, Lord at Thy birth,
Jesus, Lord at Thy birth.*

*In the name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit.
Amen.*

LCMS AND SELC TO BE IN FULL FELLOWSHIP

Many of us have been praying for the LCMS and the SELC (Siberian Evangelical Lutheran Church) to enter into altar and pulpit fellowship with one another. It seems that prayer is very close to being answered. A delegation from the LCMS, led by Rev. Dr. Albert Collver, Director of Church Relations - Assistant to the President, recently met with leaders of the SELC at Novosibirsk, in Siberia, Russia, for theological discussions. It was determined that the two Church Bodies are in doctrinal agreement and that steps should be taken immediately to officially declare them to be in full fellowship with one another. Those steps will hopefully be completed this month and, thanks to the adoption of Res. 3-04A at the 2010 LCMS National Convention, upon completion of these steps, the LCMS and the SELC will be in fellowship, and that fellowship will be presented to the 2013 LCMS National Convention for ratification. This is outstanding news, and you can read more about it at Dr. Collver's blog (<http://abc3miscellany.blogspot.com/2010/11/lcms-selc-conduct-fellowship.html>). As I said above, this will be the answer to the prayers of many of us who have longed for the day when the fellowship we share with our Lutheran brothers and sisters in Russia would be officially recognized and declared. Thanks be to God!



As you know, we have chosen to support The Siberian Lutheran Mission Society (TSLMS), which is the society that was formed to support and assist our Lutheran brothers and sisters in Russia, who belong to the SELC. For the past several months, we have had mission cans available in the fellowship hall. Hopefully, many of you have taken them and filled them up. We will be collecting the cans on **Sunday, December 12**, so please bring them with you that day. If you haven't taken any cans, you can still find some in the fellowship hall and fill them up in the next week or so. And, as always, you are more than welcome to make a donation by cash or check (make checks payable to Peace). 100% of all financial donations to TSLMS goes directly to the field to support the work of our Siberian Lutheran brothers and sisters. No funds are used for administration or overhead of TSLMS. Many of you remember watching the video about the work our Siberian Lutheran brothers and sisters are doing in very trying circumstances. They continue to need our support and we hope and pray that you will prayerfully consider giving as much as you can to this worthy endeavor. What a blessed opportunity we have to share our blessings with them, especially as we near the celebration of our Lord's Birth!

UPDATE FROM THE TREASURER

CAROL ZEILE

Again this year, the Council members agree that we should propose a budget that is as closely in line as possible with the amount of income that we expect for 2011. Reducing a budget that is already very lean is a difficult process. The draft budget that appears below represents the Council's efforts thus far. There is still opportunity for revision, based on end of year figures for 2010 or any other factors deemed appropriate.

At this time, I will make just a few comments on the changes reflected in this draft. If you have questions, please let me know or talk with any of the other Council members.

- A line for photocopier expense has been added to the budget so that we can differentiate between the copier and other office expenses.
- The music line was decreased so that the total will cover only the cost of our organist for Sunday Services. All other Services are being played as a donation by the organist. There is nothing in this budget for sheet music or conference expenses.
- We are exploring ways to decrease our telephone expenses.
- Pastor's salary is decreased by \$1800. We propose forgiving his loan payment for one year to offset this decrease.

We will be discussing the proposed budget at the Voter's Assembly meeting in January and strongly encourage all members of Peace to attend and express their opinions on the proposal.



Church Decorating

At our November meeting, the Ladies' Guild members discussed preparation of the nave and sanctuary for the upcoming Advent and Christmas seasons. As you may recall, last year we consulted *The Altar Guild Manual* by Lee A. Maxwell, Lutheran Service Book edition, to guide our decision. This manual, published by Concordia Publishing House, is authorized by the Commission on Worship of the LCMS.

One section of the *Altar Guild Manual* is devoted to the seasons of the church year. The primary theme for the Advent Season is penitential, much like the season of Lent. In addition, during Advent, there also is an emphasis on the anticipation of the birth of our Savior.

For the Advent Season, we will continue this year with our use of violet, the traditional color for altar paraments and vestments. Violet symbolizes the penitential nature of the season. In addition, we will keep our decorating very simple by removing the candelabra from the chancel, using seasonal greenery with minimal flowers instead of fancy floral arrangements and minimizing decorations in the nave. The only real decoration for the Advent Season will be the Advent Wreath.

The remainder of the decorating will be done after the Divine Service on December 19, 2010, the last Sunday in Advent. At that time we will put up the Christmas tree and the nativity set, hang the Christmas banners, bring back the candelabra and adorn the nave with wreaths and candles. The minimal decorating for Advent will be transformed into the more elaborate adornments of the Christmas Season, thus making a distinction between penitential/anticipatory Advent and joyous Christmas.

It is the sincere desire of the Ladies' Guild members to enhance the season of Advent and improve our preparation for the most joyous occasion of the birth of our Lord and Savior. **We invite and encourage all of the adults to join us on December 19, 2010, following the Divine Service, to decorate for Christmas.** There will be no Adult Bible Class that day, but the children will have Sunday School as usual. When Sunday School is complete, the **Ladies' Guild will provide a pizza lunch for everyone**, followed by the dress rehearsal of the children's Christmas program

Our life is a journey of dying. At our baptism we die and are buried with Christ. We are dead and our lives become a journey to the day of our return to dust. We live as though we are dying and die as though we are living. We can face death confidently as a restful sleep, since Christ is with us in body and soul all the way.

At our baptism, we are covered with a white garment. The white garment of Christ covers us throughout our life and then at the time of death, the white garment is placed over the casket (funeral pall), a remembrance of our baptismal garment that we have worn throughout our journey.

**THE ART OF DYING
WITH A LUTHERAN ACCENT
MY FRIEND WHEN I AM DYING**

Our hymnal speaks throughout the year from Advent through the Last Sunday of the Church Year on the Art of Dying. Thumbing through the hymnal with the following suggested hymns speaks of how well our hymns prepare us for the journey.

Lent – Christ's death. Be my life in death – (421, 439, 442, 448). Death passing over - (458, 460, 461)

Easter – (464, 468, 483, 484)

Pentecost - The Holy Spirit helps take us to Christ in the hour of death (497, 655, 758)

End of Church Year – (508)

Preparing for Death – (490, 693, 450 stanzas 5-6)

At the Deathbed – (571, 756)

Into Your Hands I Commit My Spirit – (693, 877, 878, 882)

A Blessed End is a Departure in Faith – (731)

Lord's Supper Hymns – (633, 642)

Strongest – (938-941)

Dr. Arthur A. Just, Director of Deaconess Studies, and Deaconess Student Pamela Boehle-Silva gave a presentation on how pastors and deaconesses prepare the saints for their journey to their eternal Jerusalem home. They explained the various steps from the time a person is determined to have an incurable illness to the time of their death - a time of visitation, prayers, comfort, and preparing for separation, transition and committal. (Rev. 14:13) They not only focus on the person, but on their families as well - all done with the utmost love and compassion. It was a good witness of some of the duties of a deaconess.

Dr. Just shared his experience of the first funeral he conducted as a pastor of a young man who was killed in a motorcycle accident. After the service, Dr. Just was at the back of the church with a Methodist minister and a Catholic priest when he said that he was now going to remove his vestments. The Catholic priest (who was aware of this being his first funeral service and felt a need to tutor him in the Christian way of conducting a funeral) said, "Oh, no you are not. You must keep your vestments on and remain with the body until it is finally laid to rest in the ground, you being the last person to leave the cemetery." Dr. Just went on to explain that the body is very important both before and after death, and that the pastor (I believe he meant that the pastor was representing Christ) was to remain with the body until burial.

Several of the speakers referred us to a book written by Thomas Long, entitled "Accompany Them with Singing" about conducting Christian funerals from the perspective of a pastor and a Christian. I will receive my copy soon.

Music for the Christian Funeral was presented by Kantor Richard Resch and Associate Kantor Kevin Hildebrand and we came home with some very good suggestions for proper Christian music of arrangements from our own LSB hymnal.

There were several other speakers who were truly inspirational, the services and organ recital, the Choral Vespers, and Hymn Festival were simply stupendous.

Many thanks for the opportunity to attend this awe-inspiring conference.
