

From the Desk of Pastor Messer "Come to Bethlehem and See"



It always seems like such a huge letdown, doesn't it? The days after Christmas, I mean. The days before are filled with excitement and anticipation. We can't wait to exchange gifts and get together with family and friends. This is especially true for many children, who can hardly get to sleep the night before Christmas, so anxious are they to see their presents the next morning. But, then it's all over in a flash. The gifts are ripped open, time is spent with family and friends, and then it's back to reality. That emotional high we experience may last until New Year's, but usually we've already come crashing down from it by then.

This is experienced in the Church as well, although it shouldn't be. The Sunday after Christmas is comparable to the Sunday after Easter in that it is one of the lowest attended Sundays of the year. It is as though people view these two Sundays in the year as rather anticlimactic, having just participated in the high feast celebrations of our Lord's Nativity and Resurrection. But, as I said, that shouldn't be the case for us in the Church. Why? Because EVERY Divine Service in the Lord's House is a celebration of our Lord's Birth, Death, and Resurrection for us. Every Divine Service is a "little Christmas," "a little Good Friday," and "a little Easter."

Thus, we need not have the "post-Christmas blues" in the Church, for Christmas is a year-round celebration for us. We see this marked in the Divine Liturgy as we sing the song of the holy angels in the "Gloria in Excelsis" and we experience it most fully when we gather at the altar to receive the very Body and Blood of our Lord Incarnate, who was born to be our Savior and our Food.

So it is that the stanza in the famous carol, "Come to Bethlehem and see Him whose birth the angels sing; Come adore on bended knee Christ the Lord, the newborn King," is not just an invitation to the shepherds in the field that Holy Night long ago, but a standing invitation to us. We come to Bethlehem every time we gather together for Divine Service. Bethlehem means "House of Bread" and is located wherever two or three (or more) gather together in the Presence of the One who is the Bread of Life, Jesus Christ, our Lord. The Word who became Flesh and dwelt among us continues to do so in the Holy Eucharist. He was born and placed in a manger (i.e. feeding trough), and now, having lived, died, risen, and ascended for us, He places Himself upon the manger of the altar to be our Food and Drink, that, partaking of His very Body and Blood, we would be strengthened and preserved in the one, true faith.

Come to Bethlehem and see, my friends. Come to the Divine Service often, for you will experience Christmas, Good Friday, and Easter each and every time you do! Your servant in Christ,

"Why Go to the **Divine Service?**" By Rev. Shane R. Cota Pastor at St. John Lutheran (Hayes) and Trinity Lutheran (Maple Valley) in Suring, WI

What follows is an excellent article, which Pastor Cota posted on his blog (www.pastorcota.blogspot.com) in early December. I thought it prudent to include it here, since it fleshes out what I wrote in my article on the front page, and since this is the time of the year when we are inclined to make "New Year's resolutions." What better resolution could we make than to be in the Lord's House for Divine Service as often as possible in the new year? Pastor Cota provides a detailed summary as to why this is so important. I hope you will read and take it to heart.

As church attendance continues to decline in many congregations, we need to be reminded just how important it is for Christians to attend the services of the church. First of all, who is the church? The church is the congregation of saints, the people of God, among whom the Gospel is purely taught and the Sacraments (such as Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper) are rightly administered. The Gospel and the Sacraments are the "lifeblood" of a Christian (and of

the whole church of believers), because it is through these very means, as through instruments, that our Lord comes to the sinner to bring him to repentance and to bestow on him the forgiveness of sins and eternal life. Those who have

been baptized continue in their Christian life by gathering with their fellow believers to hear the Word and receive the Body and Blood of Christ. Gathering for services of the Word and the Sacraments (where God serves you with these good gifts so that you may continue in the faith and be saved) is not optional or an occasional "extra" for the Christian life, but rather is the very center of your life in Christ.

Just being baptized or being on the "membership list" of a congregation does not make you a Christian if you do not continue to hear the Word and continually abide in Christ. As Jesus says, "Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit by itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in me." (John 15:4) Christians "abide" in Christ. Many are under the false perception that if they "believe in Jesus" (or at least think they do), they don't need to go to church, when in reality it is people who believe in Jesus who indeed do go to church, that they may continue to "abide" in Christ. Again, it is in the preaching of the Word and in the Sacraments where Christ has promised to be for us for the salvation of our souls.

Just "saying" you believe in Christ, and using His name and thinking that saves you apart from hearing the Word and receiving the Sacraments is a false delusion and has led you to a false security that may end up damning you. As Jesus says when speaking of the day of judgment, "Not everyone who says to me, 'Lord, Lord,' will enter the kingdom of heaven, but the one who does the will of my Father who is in heaven. On that day many will say to me, 'Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in your name, and cast out demons in your name, and do many mighty works in your name?' And then will I declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from me, you workers of lawlessness."" (Mat 7:21-23) How horrible it will be on that day for those who must hear these dreaded words from the mouth of the Lord, "I never knew you, depart from me ... " But how could He have ever known you, if you have refused His coming to you though His Word and in His Sacraments? Saying that you believe in Jesus, and rarely hearing His Word or receiving His very Body and Blood is like telling your spouse that you love him or her, but never spending any time at all talking to, or seeing, him or her. That is no love at all, but a lie.

Our Lord has given us the command to hear His Word in the Ten Commandments. As we learn in the Catechism: "What is the Third Commandment? Remember the Sabbath day by keeping it holy. What does this mean? We should fear

We despise God's Word never spending any time at all talking to, or seeing, when him or her. That is no love at all, but a lie.

and love God so that we do His word, but hold it sacred and gladly hear and learn we refuse or deliberately neglect opportunities to hear it. for

hearing the Word is something we should do "gladly." If you are not glad to hear the Word, then how can you consider yourself to be a believer? Why does God give us this commandment? Is it because He wants to burden us with "having" to go to the Divine Service? No. He gives us this commandment for our own good, so that we may not neglect His Gospel gifts and so that ultimately we can be with Him in His eternal kingdom. He knows how the world, the devil, and our own sinful flesh easily become weak and cause us to drift from the faith that saves, so He has provided His services of Gospel and Sacrament, so that we may be strengthened and nourished and kept in the one true faith as we wander in the wilderness of this life. The services of the Gospel and Sacraments are given to us out of love for us, for our own eternal good, so we should be devoted to them.

In Acts, chapter 2, after many of the people became Christians through the preaching of the Word and Baptism on the day of Pentecost, we are told what the believers did after converting to faith in Christ. We are told that "...they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers." (Acts 2:42) Christians are "devoted to" 1) the apostles' teaching, which is the preaching of the Word; 2) the fellowship, which is the gathering together of Christians to be in communion with one another; 3) the breaking of the bread, which is the Lord's Supper; and 4) the prayers, which is the church making petitions to God and praising Him. This is exactly what Christians do when they gather for the Divine Services of the church (as Christians have historically done). In fact, they are devoted to this, because this is the very center of the Christian life and Christ is at the center of these things for us and for our salvation. This passage from Acts describes what the Christian is devoted to after his Baptism into Christ. And parents who have their children baptized, if they care about the eternal salvation of their children, will bring their children up in this faith and practice. In Acts 2, Peter says the promise is for the people and their children. This is why Lutheran day schools and Sunday schools are important as well. We need to take seriously what Moses said to the Israelites: "You shall therefore lay up these words of mine in your heart and in your soul, and you shall bind them as a sign on your hand, and they shall be as frontlets between your eyes. You shall teach them to your children, talking of them when you are sitting in your house, and when you are walking by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. You shall write them on the doorposts of your house and on your gates..." (Deu 11:18-20) This is how much our lives should be saturated with the Word of God, not only for our own benefit, but for the benefit of our children as well.

The apathy and indifference of Christians toward the services, schools, Sunday School and Bible studies of the church is astounding. We still live in a country where we are free to attend services and believe in the one true God -Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In some countries, people literally die to go to church! And yet we sit here with all our comforts and could not care less. If people who profess to be Christians and allow their names to stand on congregational membership lists don't even take the faith seriously, why should anyone else? Why is church attendance often so poor? There is no excuse for this. We need it more than anything else in the world. And no, it is not a good excuse to not come to church because you don't "like" the pastor, or you don't "like" some of the people, or you don't like "having" to stand up, or you don't like doing similar services all the time, or because your favorite hymns aren't always sung, or because the service is too long, or because it is your only day to go shopping, or to sleep in, and so on and so on. When an excuse pops into your head, just think, "Would God be pleased to hear this excuse from me on Judgment Day?" And besides, Christians don't look for excuses not to go to church. Are the Law and Gospel preached and are the Sacraments correctly administered in the services? If so, then you have no excuse. If you cannot come to the services due to infirmities of some sort, notify the pastor, and he will come to you.

Let us hear encouragement from the book of Hebrews. The author is addressing the very same problem we face here: *"Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful. And let us* consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near. For if we go on sinning deliberately after receiving the knowledge of the truth, there no longer remains a sacrifice for sins, but a fearful expectation of judgment, and a fury of fire that will consume the adversaries." (Heb 10:23-27) Either Christ will come again in glory or we will die before that. Either way, we need to be prepared, or we will be caught unaware and be damned forever, which would be completely senseless, because God has graciously given us His means all along so that we may escape the day of wrath and be saved. This is no joke. It is deadly serious and has eternal consequences. As the church here in this place, we must pray that we may be led to repentance for thinking little of God's Word and Sacraments and pray that all who have fallen away may be returned to the fold, so that we may all at last gather around the Lamb who was slain, so that we may sing His praises eternally in the peace and joy of His presence.

When you come to the Divine Service, you are partaking of heavenly worship itself. In the book of Revelation, the apostle John gets to see the veil between heaven and earth pulled aside, while he is worshiping "in the Spirit," "on the Lord's Day." He sees the heavenly worship and describes it in Revelation 4, 5, 7, and other places. While we cannot see behind the veil between heaven and earth, we can be certain that the services where Christ Himself is present are no small thing and that there is much more going on than we can ever see now. In the book of Hebrews, we are told what we are coming to when we come to the Divine Service: "But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God, the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel. See that you do not refuse him who is speaking. For if they did not escape when they refused him who warned them on earth, much less will we escape if we reject him who warns from heaven. At that time his voice shook the earth, but now he has promised, "Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heavens." This phrase, "Yet once more," indicates the removal of things that are shaken--that is, things that have been made--in order that the things that cannot be shaken may remain. Therefore let us be grateful for receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, and thus let us offer to God acceptable worship, with reverence and awe, for our God is a consuming fire." (Heb 12:22-29) That says it all. No matter how plain the services may appear to us, or how ordinary or insignificant, God tells us that much more is going on than we can now see. May we abide in Christ now, so that one day we shall see the other side of the veil, which is more than we could even take right now. Lord, have mercy.

DECEMBER 7, 2009

Opening Prayer/Devotion: The meeting opened with a prayer by Vice-President Carol Zeile. President Coaline Luplow's work schedule prevented her from attending. Carol presented the devotion for the day from "Higher Things Reflections". The Mite basket was passed and Mites collected.

Secretary's Report: Approved as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Sharyn Greening reported that the tentative amount generated from the Cookie Walk and Craft Show was \$1,640.81. An application was submitted to Thrivent Financial for \$420 available from the Care in Congregation funds. Fund balances are: Savings, \$2,355.29. Checking, \$654.98. The Guild Christmas gift of \$100 to our Seminary Student has not been sent yet due to the lack of a current address for him. The Treasurer's Report was approved as presented.

Committee Reports:

- Altar: Carol read a portion from the LCMS Altar Guild Manual. She informed the ladies that banners and superfrontals (and matching chalice veils and bookmarks) have been purchased for all the seasons of the Church Year now. Final preparations for Christmas decorating was also discussed.
- Banner: One of the older banners needs repair. Gretchen will meet with Pastor to discuss the banners.
- **Kitchen:** An inventory of the kitchen supplies was done and needed supplies were purchased. Balance in the coffee fund as of Dec. 7 was \$66.42. The Rada cutlery was discussed and a conscious effort to make it known throughout the congregation will be taken. *Motion made by Sharyn, support by Charlotte, that a container be purchased for the cutlery, and that it be displayed one Sunday a month and be made available for purchase at that time. Approved.*
- Library: No report.
- Sunshine: Cards are being sent. Marlene inquired about return address labels, if any had been ordered through the Church office and if there was a cost involved. Mary said that none had been ordered, but that she could make some at no cost.
- Special Events: Nothing new to report.

Other Reports:

- Charitable Donations: Dorothy Trgina discussed the schedule that will be followed for collections for Lutheran World Relief in the coming year. Look for info on Ladies' Guild board.
- **Comments by Pastor:** Pastor Messer was not able to attend. However, on his behalf, the possibility of the Ladies' Guild making a donation toward our congregation's support of Issues, Etc. was discussed. Will be on agenda early in 2010.
- Seminary Student Report: The most recent letter from the seminary student is on the bulletin board.
- **Projects:** 1) Mary expressed the need for a suitable stand to hold the feast day bulletins. There is a little table in the sacristry that is currently not being used and it might work well for placing the bulletins and the offering plate; 2) A Prie Dieu kneeling bench for Pastor Messer was discussed. A catalogue with various pictures and prices was passed around for the ladies to view.

Old Business:

- Cookie Walk: There were 656 dozen cookies, 18 crafters, and 19 workers.
- Advent Dinners: There will be a pot-luck dinner prior to the Children's Christmas Program.
- **Taking down Christmas decorations:** In past years the decorations have been taken down after Epiphany, and following that timeline the decorations would be taken down on Jan. 9. Because Feb. 2 is the date of The Presentation of our Lord, should the decorations be left until then? Pastor will be consulted.
- **Coffee Hostesses:** More coffee hostesses are needed for 2010.
- **Funeral Policy:** The funeral policy has been retyped, but Coaline advises that similar wording appears in the Special Events section of the handbook, and that section will also need re-typing.

New Business:

- Christmas Wreath: We discussed purchasing a large outside wreath for the door at the fellowship hall. Last year's wreath cost \$78.86. Mary Jakolat said they purchased a large wreath for the outside of their home, but didn't use it. If her husband is agreeable, their wreath can be donated. While large, it is a smaller size than the wreath usually purchased.
- **Robes for acolytes:** The robes are in bad shape. This item will be considered next month.
- **Constitution:** The Ladies Guild Constitution is out-dated and needs to be revised to better reflect the structure of the current organization. Coaline, Carol, Sharyn, Lois, and Megan Brown will meet in January.

Upon the close of the meeting, the Ladies enjoyed a gift exchange with a Christmas Reading by Sharyn Greening.

Thank you to Marlene Miller and Charlotte Dargie for serving as hostesses for this meeting. The next meeting will be on January 4, 2010 with Mary Jakolat as hostess.




Registration Is Now Open for the 2nd Annual BJS National Conference!

Your love has found a means for bringing grace to humanity, of which neither angels nor human beings would have dared to think! Namely, that the second person of the Godhead was to become man, to sanctify and cleanse our human nature. O gracious Jesus, everlasting praise and thanks to You for Your incarnation and birth. You became a child of

man that we might become children of God. Now our human nature is truly exalted: You have united it with Your divinity, and brought it into the council of the Holy Trinity. O love! O grace! As surely as the human nature is united with the divine, so surely everlasting friendship, everlasting reconciliation, everlasting peace and everlasting love has been established between God and all people. When God beholds us in His Son, He cannot but be gracious to us. For He who spared not His beloved Son, but delivered Him up for us all, how shall He not with Him freely give us all things – the forgiveness of sins, righteousness, peace, life, and salvation?

Oh, the greatness of the love of Jesus, who chose to be born a tender infant, that He might sanctify our sinful birth! He increased in wisdom and stature that He might sanctify our youth.
