FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR MESSER

"A New Year's Resolution You Can Count On" Romans 8:31-39

(Adapted from the New Year's Eve sermon I preached here at Peace in 2005)

Dear fellow redeemed in Christ,

Well, it's happened. Another year has come and gone. It doesn't seem possible that another year could've passed by so quickly, does it? I'm learning that the older you get, the days, months, and years seem to go by faster and faster. Where does the time go?

It's hard for me to believe that it's already been over 2 1/2 years since I began as pastor here at Peace. You know, the old cliche, "Life is short," isn't just an old cliche - it's a fact. Life is short. The years that we're given to live on this earth just race right by, don't they? It seems like we were just ushering in 2007, and here we are already welcoming 2008. It's quite sobering, when you think about. It's quite sobering when you realize that our earthly lives, when compared to eternity, are but a grain of sand upon the seashore.

Be that as it may, this is a special time for us—a time when we look back upon the year that's about to end and look forward to the year that's about to begin. It's a time for us to take stock of our lives and the lives of those around us; a time for us to count and be thankful for the many blessings we've received in the past year. Maybe 2007 was a banner year for you. Maybe it was a year that will produce nothing but good memories for you

for years to come. Or, maybe it was a year that can't come to an end fast enough; a year that you would like to erase from your memory bank.

But, whatever the case, whether 2007 is a year you would like to remember or forget, the beginning of a new year brings hopes and dreams, anxious anticipation, and wishful thinking: "Maybe 2008 will be *my* year. Maybe this will be the year things turn around for me. Maybe great things are in store for me in the coming year."

We all have those hopes and dreams, don't we? We are excited to begin a new year because we are hopeful that things will be better this year. Even those who are struggling and suffering, having a bad time of it right now, can escape their misery for a few moments during this time of the year to hope and dream, to wish for things to get better in the new year.

But, as we begin a new year, we don't just leave our fate to hopes and dreams, do we? We make resolutions. We'll change things ourselves, this year, won't we? Good intentions are at an all time high and will power is exalted to a place of invincibility. We resolve to make changes in our lives this year. This will be the year we get healthy. We're going to quit smoking, quit drinking so much, and start exercising. We're going to quit eating so much junk food, eliminate frivolous snacking, and go on a healthy diet.

But, those are only the resolutions we make concerning our physical well-being. There are other kinds of resolutions being made. Some are resolving to be a little kinder, a little more patient, a little less angry. This will be the year we make our relationships better. We'll show more love to our loved ones this year; we'll be more forgiving and understanding; we'll have more compassion on the poor and less fortunate; we'll visit our loved ones more often; we'll heal broken relationships. We're going to be a little nicer this year. In the words of the popular country

song, Live Like You Were Dying, we're going to "love deeper, speak sweeter, and give forgiveness we've been denying."

And finally, in addition to the resolutions concerning our physical well-being and our personalities and relationships. there is another set of resolutions that often get made tonight - those concerning our spiritual well-being. Many who've been away from the church for a while will resolve to go back to their church or to find a church home this year. For those of us who have a church home and attend regularly, we'll resolve to not miss a service this year, to start attending Bible Study, to begin daily devotions at home, to read the Bible and to pray every day, to get more involved in the church, giving more of our time, talents, and money to

support the Gospel. We're going to grow in the Word and increase our faith this year! Not only that, but this is going to be the year

when we muster up the courage to be faithful witnesses. We're going to spread the message of the Good News of Jesus to our family, friends, neighbors, and co-workers. We're going to be better Christians, better and more faithful witnesses for our Lord.

In response to all of the resolutions we make as we usher in a new year, I have good news and bad news for you. I'll start with the bad news.

The bad news is that while nearly everyone makes resolutions at the onset of a new year, very few keep them. While intentions are good, the flesh is weak. Many will not smoke their last cigarette tonight. Many will not drink too much for the last time tonight. Many will not follow through with a healthy diet and daily exercise. Many will fail to be the new and improved, nicer and more loving version of themselves. Many will not follow through on their resolution to attend church and Bible Study every week, to read the Bible and pray every day, and to be the soldiers for Christ they intend to be. Some will accomplish the resolutions they make this year, but most won't. The great majority of resolutionmakers will fail to live up to their good intentions. They may make it for a few days, weeks, even a month or two, but eventually the weakness of their flesh will win out and they will fail to live up to their expectations.

That's not to say that we shouldn't make resolutions. Good intentions are just that - good. Not only should we make resolutions, but we should try our best to keep them. It would be very good for us to get healthy, to be more loving, and to grow in our faith. We should desire these things. We should resolve to do our best to bring these things about. But, the simple fact of the matter is that we're weak. We're sinful human beings. We're imperfect. We're failures. We know that. We know it because our sinful nature rears its ugly head every day. We know it because we often can't even make it home from church without committing sin.

But, I have good news for you as well. The good news is that there is One who makes resolutions and keeps them. God resolved to save us from our sins by sending His Son into the world to fulfill the law we can't fulfill and to pay the price we owe for our sins on the cross. God is faithful to His resolutions - He sent His Son, Jesus the Christ, who accomplished everything necessary for our salvation. Our Lord is a resolution-maker and a resolution-keeper. He makes promises and is completely, one hundred percent, faithful to them. He knows your pitiful condition. He knows how incapable you are of keeping the resolutions you make. He knows that your weak flesh is more often than not stronger than your good intentions. And yet, He loves you anyway, and He resolves to shower you with His forgiveness, life, and salvation—to keep you in the one, true faith that you may be His forever. This is the remarkable Good News I have for you as you begin this new year.

In the words of St. Paul from Romans 8: "What, then, shall we say in response to this? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all -- how will he not also, along with him, gra-

ciously give us all things? Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. Who is he that condemns? Christ Jesus, who died -- more than that, who was raised to life -- is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: 'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Rom. 8:31-39).

This is one of the most beautiful passages in all of Scripture. You would be hard-pressed to find a more wonderful and appropriate passage to consider as we usher in a new year. It assures us that nothing that has happened in the past year, whether good or bad, nor anything that will happen in the year that is about to begin, whether good or bad, could ever separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord. That's the Good News, the Gospel, and it far outweighs the bad.

As you look back on 2007 and look forward to 2008, here's a New Years' resolution you can count on: Your Lord Jesus is with you at all times. He is with you through the good and the bad. He is with you when you mourn, suffer, and grieve. He is with you when you're sick, when you're diagnosed with a fatal disease, when you're on your deathbed. He is with you through financial difficulties and broken relationships. He is with you when you celebrate the birth of a child, when you experience the joy of marriage, when you're healthy and experience wonderful blessings in your life. He is with you at all times. That's His resolution and He keeps it.

Even though you're a sinner and don't deserve His love, don't deserve His blessings, don't deserve for Him to be with you, He is there. He has always been there, ever since He placed His Name upon you and sealed you with the Holy Spirit at your baptism. He comes to you in the Divine Service through His Word and Sacrament. He gives you His very Body and Blood to strengthen and preserve you in the true faith. He resolves to continue to be with you throughout the coming year. He will continue to meet you here, in His Holy House, to forgive you of your sins, to feed you with His Life-giving Word and Holy Supper, and to bolster your faith. He resolves to love you completely and He has kept, and always will keep, His resolution to you. Know and believe this and continue to come to this Holy Place where He promises to meet you, and 2008 will be a year of tremendous blessing for you, no matter what comes your way. In Jesus' Holy and Precious Name. Amen.

NOTES ON SERVICE SCHEDULE:

- Lent is already on its way: The earliest date upon which Easter can fall is March 22. This year it falls on March 23, which means that the season of Epiphany is shortened dramatically and Lent will be here before we know it (Ash Wednesday is February 6!).
- The Season of Pre-Lent (Septuagesima, Sexagesima, Quinquagesima): The season of Pre-Lent is meant to be a short pause in the church year before entering into the long journey of Lent. So, if Easter is the destination and Lent is the journey, then Pre-Lent is something like a dock where you wait to get on a boat so that you can travel to your final location. Pre-Lent starts at about 70 days out from Easter to parallel the 70 years of the Babylonian captivity of the ancient Israelites. This parallel reminds us that we are each called by God and taken on a journey from the exile and captivity of sin to our promised home in the New Jerusalem come down from heaven on the Last Day. The Sundays in Pre-Lent are named after the time out from Easter they signify (they do not correspond to the exact times): Septuagesima means "seventieth"; Sexagesima means "sixtieth"; Quinquagesima means "fiftieth."
- Special times of Services: Please note the special times of the Services marked by asterisks above. Whenever we celebrate a Feast Day on Saturday, we will do so at 10:00 a.m., not at the normal 12:00 p.m. time (Holy Saturday as well). The reason for the 7:30 p.m. time for the Office of Tenebrae on Good Friday evening is to ensure that the sanctuary is dark for the dramatic conclusion of the Service.
- <u>Feast Day Services</u>: The liturgy for the Feast Day Services we celebrate throughout the year will be sung, not spoken as announced previously (unless Mary and Beth are both unavailable to play). This is so that they, which are supposed to be more celebratory in nature, can properly contrast with our Daily Holy Week Services, which will be spoken, since they are more meditative in nature.


