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From the Desk of Pastor Messer "A New Year of Being Made New"

"And He who was seated on the throne said, 'Behold, I am making all things new!" (Rev. 21:5)

Notice the tense of the verb spoken by our Lord Jesus Christ in the verse above. It is not past or future, but present. He doesn't say I have made or will make all things new, but I *am making* all things new!

That is very significant, my friends, for it assures us that our Lord Jesus Christ is no absentee landlord, but an active Savior and very present help in our time of need. It is true that He "*made* all things new" by His death and resurrection and that He "*will make* all things new" on the Last Day when He returns in glory, but it is equally true that He is, even now, "*making* all things new." He is "with us always" just as He promised to be. He continues to do mighty things in our presence, gifting us with forgiveness, life, and salvation through the precious means of grace He Himself established—His Holy Word and Sacraments. As we continue to come into His presence and receive these gifts from His gracious hands, He continues to make us new, preserving us as His beautiful and immaculate Bride, perfectly holy and righteous in His Father's sight.

It is this glorious truth, this beautiful promise, this awesome reality, which allows us to transition into a new earthly year without fear, and full of confidence. We don't know what lies ahead for us in this new year, but we do know that nothing—not financial difficulties, not broken relationships, not illness or injury, not even death—can separate us from the love God has for us who are continuously made new by His Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord (cf. For it is when we "meet together" in the Divine Service that our Lord washes us clean in His Blood and makes us ever new.

Ceremonial Catechesis What's Up With All That Bowing?

In my initial article for this new series last month, I addressed the reason why we practice the elevation and genuflection during the Words of Institution. I also spent a great deal of time addressing the oft-heard accusation against many ancient ceremonies that they are "too (Roman) Catholic." I won't spend time here, or in the future, rehashing that, but suffice it to say, what I said last month on that front applies to many of the ceremonies I'll be discussing in the months ahead, beginning with this month's topic: Bowing.

"Oh come, let us worship and bow down; let us kneel before the LORD, our Maker" (Psalm 95:6). Many of you may recognize that Psalm verse from the Venite, which is sung during Matins. It sums things up rather nicely, namely that worship and bowing go hand in hand. In fact, the very word we translate "worship" in both the Hebrew of the Old Testament and the Greek of the New Testament means, "to prostrate oneself in reverence." Thus, a literal translation of that fa-

mous Psalm verse is, "Oh come, let us prostrate ourselves in reverence and bow down before the LORD, our Maker." Worship and bowing go hand in hand. To worship is to bow. Literally.

For that reason, the ceremonial act of bowing has always been part and parcel of Christian worship. It is the natural reaction we see time and time again in Holy Scripture when sinners come into the presence of our Holy God. We bow because we know that we're not worthy to be in God's presence. We bow in fear and submission and humility. We bow in reverence. We bow also in adoration. It's only natural and proper and right. We bow. We worship. Same thing.

Most of you already know this, and do this, by instinct. When you approach the altar of your Lord, you bow. It comes naturally. No one has to tell you, or remind you, that this is what you should do—you just do it. It just feels right and proper to do so, because, well, it is. You worship your Lord, that is, you bow.

There are different kinds or forms of bowing: Bowing of the head, bowing at the waist, genuflecting (bowing and placing your right knee on the ground), or full blown prostration (bowing all the way to the ground and lying flat on your face). During the Divine Service, there are several times when it is appropriate and customary to bow in the different ways mentioned (with the exception of prostration, which is rarely done), and you have undoubtedly noticed the elder and I, and other members, doing so. What follows is a summary of all the usual times during the Divine Service when the ceremonial act of bowing is appropriate and customary. But, let me make this clear before proceeding: This is not Law! Our Lord is not going to strike you down if you do not bow at this or that time during the Divine Service. While bowing at the usual times listed below is appropriate and customary, Jesus is not keeping track of who bows and who doesn't (and neither should you!). The purpose of ceremonies is not to demand lockstep uniformity in bodily actions by all attendant worshipers. The purpose of ceremonies, as was indicated last month, is to teach the faithful what they need to know about Christ. Bowing is just another in a long list of ancient ceremonies that serves to do that teaching. Bowing teaches the faithful that they are in our Lord's Holy House of Prayer, where He is Present among them to serve them. Bowing is a recognition of that awesome reality and teaches the faithful that their humility, reverence, and adoration are in order. Bowing also teaches the faithful that it is appropriate and customary to revere their Lord not only with their lips, but with their bodies. But, to be sure, this is not Law. You are invited in Gospel freedom to bow at the appropriate and customary times, but certainly not demanded to do so. With that caveat out of the way, here are the times during the Divine Service when bowing is appropriate and customary:

Upon entering or leaving the pew: Many Lutherans will either bow their heads or bow at their waists, and some will even genuflect, toward the altar upon entering or leaving the pew. They do so in recognition that they have entered the Holy Place where their Lord will soon be (or has been) Present among them upon the Holy Altar and they wish to show Him reverence. Any of the various forms of bowing are appropriate and customary here.

During the Processional or Recessional: When the Processional Crucifix passes your pew, either during the processional or recessional, it is appropriate and customary to bow your head in reverence to your Lord, whose work of your salvation is symbolized by the Crucifix (it is also appropriate and customary to make the sign of the cross at this time, too, but I'll discuss that ceremony in a future article).

At the Gloria Patri: The Gloria Patri means "Glory be to the Father" and is shorthand for any time we say or sing, "Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Spirit (Ghost)." Whenever we say or sing glory to the full Name of our Triune God (during the Introit, the Nunc Dimittis, or any other time), it is appropriate and customary to bow at the waist out of reverence and adoration for His Name. That bowing should begin at the word "Glory" and be maintained all the way through the word "Spirit" (or "Ghost"), after which you cease bowing and stand (or sit) upright again.

At the Name of Jesus: St. Paul says in Philippians 2:9-10, "Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Ultimately, this will be fulfilled on the Last Day when every human being ever created will stand before Jesus for judgment. On that Day, everyone will bow before Him and confess Him as Lord, believers and unbelievers alike. But, Christians already do this. Thus, from the very earliest days in the Church, Christians began the custom of bowing their heads each and every time the Name of Jesus was spoken or sung during the Divine Service, except during the sermon, when they fixed their eyes on the pastor who was preaching Jesus to them. In bowing the head at the Name of Jesus, Christians are affirming that His Name is indeed above all names and that He is indeed worthy of our eternal reverence and adoration. Speaking from experience, once you begin this practice, it becomes second nature fairly quickly, so that your head will bow when your ears hear the Name of Jesus without you even thinking about it, and that really is a beautiful thing if you take the time to ponder it.

During the Singing of the Gloria in Excelsis: There are a few places during the singing of the Gloria in Excelsis where it is appropriate and customary to bow the head (or at the waist). At the words "... we worship Thee ... for Thy great glory ... have mercy upon us ... receive our prayer ... have mercy upon us." And, as already mentioned, at the Name of Jesus, it is appropriate and customary to bow your head. The first couple of times mentioned here ("we worship Thee" and "for Thy great glory") are worthy of our bows because we are singing about worshiping our Lord specifically for His Holy Incarnation, i.e. His becoming Flesh to live and die for us. That's what "Thy great glory" refers to here—His Incarnation. Definitely worthy of our reverence. And, besides, worship and bowing go hand in hand, as mentioned above, so it is only naturally to bow when we're singing about worshiping our Lord. The other times mentioned here ("have mercy upon us" [twice] and "receive our prayer") are worthy of our bows because we're petitioning the Lamb of God who takest away the sin of the world to have mercy upon us and receive our prayer, and certainly bowing is an appropriate posture for that.

At the Salutation: The Salutation is when the pastor says, "The Lord be with you," and you respond, "And with your spirit" (or, "And also with you"). This happens three times in the Divine Service. It is appropriate and customary to bow at your waist as the pastor extends his arms toward you and says his part, and for the pastor to bow at his waist as you extend your arms toward him and say your part. Why? Because this is not a simple greeting taking place here, but a confession of the reality in which we've all entered. When the pastor says, "The Lord be with you," he's not saying, "Good morning," or "How y'all doing today?" or "Gee, I hope the Lord will be with you today," etc. No, he's making a confession that the Lord is, in fact, with you. He is in our midst. He is here—with us. And that is worthy of your reverence. Likewise, when you respond to the pastor, you're not saying, "And a good morning backatya, pastor," or "Gee, I hope the Lord will be with you today, pastor," etc. No, you're confessing back to the pastor that what he has confessed is true. You're saying, "Yes, pastor, the Lord is with us, for He speaks to us through you, His called and ordained servant." What you're really doing is reaffirming the ordination of the pastor, recognizing that the Office he is fulfilling is Christ's Office, that your pastor stands before you *in persona Christi*, in the person of Christ. That's why the Salutation has often been referred to as a "Mini-Ordination Rite." And that is certainly worthy of the pastor's reverence. So, you bow; then, I bow. We worship our Lord Jesus, who is with us.

During the Nicene Creed: Again, at the Name of Jesus, it is appropriate and customary to bow your head. You may have also noticed a couple of other bows done by the elder and I while reciting the Creed. We genuflect during the words, ". . . and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary, and was made man," making the sign of the cross at the words "and was made man." This practice goes way, way back in the Church, as Christians have always given the Holy Incarnation of our Lord Jesus their highest reverence and adoration. While our nave is not conducive to everyone genuflecting at that point in the Creed, it is

certainly appropriate and customary for congregants to bow at the waist as they recite those most blessed words, and to make the sign of the cross at the words "and was made man." It is also appropriate and customary to bow at the waist later in the Creed at the words, "... is worshiped and glorified," again, the reason being that worship and bowing go hand in hand. We not only indicate that our Triune God is worshiped and glorified with our lips, but we worship and glorify Him by bowing.

During the Prayer of the Church and the Lord's Prayer (and all other prayers): It is appropriate and customary to bow your heads while the Prayer of the Church, the Lord's Prayer, and all other prayers (collects) are prayed, which most of you already do out of instinct. Bowing of the head is always an appropriate posture while praying to our Triune God.

During the Sanctus: It is appropriate and customary to bow at the waist during the words, "Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of Sabaoth; heav'n and earth are full of Thy glory" or "Holy, holy, holy Lord God of power and might: Heaven and earth are full of Your glory" (at the word "glory," you stand upright again, although I know some people who like to bow for the entire Sanctus, which is fine, too—there are no hard and fast rules to any of this). Why bow here? Because what we are confessing here is that we, like Isaiah, have entered the Heavenly Throne Room, where our Lord Jesus Christ is seated at the right hand of God. His very Body and Blood will soon be upon the Holy Altar for us to eat and to drink for the forgiveness of our sins and strengthening of our faith (just as Isaiah had his lips touched by the burning coal of the heavenly altar for his forgiveness—see Isaiah 6 for the whole scene). Here, at the Holy Altar, is where heaven and earth come together as one. Here is where our high-est worship and reverence and adoration is due. So, we bow. We worship. Same thing.

During the Consecration: I touched upon this last month while discussing the elevation and genuflection, but I thought I'd flesh this out a little more here. Again, at the Name of Jesus, it is appropriate and customary to bow your head. It is also appropriate and customary to bow at the waist (or your head) when the actual words of Jesus are spoken over the bread and the wine. You stand upright until the words "... and said ...," then you bow while Jesus' words are recited. Then, you look up at the Body and the Blood when they are elevated, bowing at the waist (or your head) when the pastor and elder genuflect, rising upright again when they rise. When the pastor holds the Body and Blood before you and recites the Pax Domini ("The Peace of the Lord be with you always"), it is appropriate and customary to fix your eyes upon Jesus, the author and perfecter of your faith, rather than bow. Also, during the singing of the Agnus Dei ("O Christ, Thou Lamb of God, that takest away the sin of the world ..."), you can bow your head at the words, "have mercy upon us" and "grant us Thy peace," but the custom is to fix your eyes upon the Holy Altar during the rest of the song. You will bow again when you approach the altar and kneel to receive Jesus in the Sacrament.

During the Benediction: Some people prefer to bow their heads during the whole Benediction, while others prefer to look at the pastor and bow their heads (and make the sign of the cross) at the words, ". . . and give you peace." There is ancient precedence for either of these practices.

At the Altar: Anytime anyone ever approaches, passes by, or departs from the Holy Altar, they should bow their heads (or at the waist) in reverence. The pastor and elders are trained to do this, as are the wonderful ladies who serve on our altar guild, as are our acolytes. All congregants should do this, too, when they come up to receive the Sacrament, and when they leave. But, this practice applies even beyond the Divine Service. If you're decorating or cleaning or just coming up to pray—anytime you approach, pass by, or depart from the Holy Altar—bowing is called for. The reason for this is obvious. This is the Holy of Holies, the very place where the very Body and Blood of Jesus, which He gave and shed in His once-for-all Sacrifice for our sins on the Cross, takes up residence among us. Reverence for the Holy Altar is simply not optional.

So, there you go. That's what's up with all that bowing. Again, I want to make it vividly clear that none of this is Law. Your salvation does not depend upon whether or not you bow at all the appropriate and customary places. At the same time, worship and bowing go hand in hand, which is why Christians of all generations, including the hundreds of generations that predate Roman Catholicism (just in case anyone is tempted to think that all this talk of bowing is "too Roman Catholic"), have practiced the ceremonial act of bowing during the Divine Service at the places I've mentioned above. Whether or not you choose to adopt some, all, or none of these practices is left to your personal piety. It is my goal here simply to make you aware of why we do what we do when it comes to all that bowing, as I've had several members ask me to do so for some time now.


