From the Desk of Pastor Messer

"Post-Voters' Assembly Thoughts"

Dear fellow redeemed in Christ,

I have no idea how many Voters' Assemblies I have sat through in my day. I have been serving in some leadership aspect of various congregations for nearly twenty years now, so I know it's been a lot. I have seen the good, the bad, and the ugly. Most often, the ugliest Voters' Assemblies I've witnessed were those in which the budget was being discussed. That's probably no surprise to anyone. There's a reason why we're taught, and warned, in Holy Scripture that "the love of money is a root of all kinds of evils" (1 Tim. 6:10). When the subject of money comes up, people can often get downright nasty with one another. I still can't believe some of the things I've heard come out of the mouths of people who claimed to be Christians during Voters' Assemblies through the years.

With that said, I wasn't exactly counting the seconds in eager anticipation of the Voters' Assembly we had this past Sunday. Knowing that we would be discussing the budget was worrisome to me and made me a little apprehensive. It's like the great theologian Forest Gump once said, "Voters' Assemblies are like a box of chocolates; you never know what yer gonna git" (okay, so Forest said that about life, and not Voters' Assemblies, but I think it still applies).

But, thanks be to God, my worries were unfounded. That Voters' Assembly we had last Sunday was one of the very best I have ever attended. I mean that! The members of our Church Council deserve high praise and hearty thanks for the diligent work they did in preparation, and for the stellar, very professional, and very Christian way in which they presented the fruits of their labors to the assembly. I think everyone who attended was thoroughly impressed by what they witnessed. I know I was. Our Council members painted an accurate picture of where we are as a congregation financially, complete with detailed charts and spreadsheets, and offered ideas on how we can get to where we need to be, so that the Lord's work can continue to be done among us. I am very proud of my brothers and sisters in Christ who serve on our Church Council. They

worked very hard over these past several weeks, giving up many hours of their own personal time to meet, discuss, and prepare (without any pastoral influence or interference from me), and they did a fabulous job! I was so glad to hear several members speak up in recognition of that fact during the meeting.

I was also extremely pleased with how everyone in the assembly conducted themselves that day. This was how a Christian Voters' Assembly should be-brothers and sisters in Christ discussing important matters relating to their congregation in the spirit of Christian love and charity. Concerns, and even disagreements, were expressed, and responded to, in that spirit, and it was wonderful to witness. It brought to mind Psalm 133:1, "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity!" I saw and heard unity that day-the unity of the Spirit which resides in all who have faith in Christ; the unity which shows itself forth among Christians, who say, "Even though things may not go exactly as I would like. I love my Lord and my brothers and sisters in Christ, and I will support the ministry and mission of this congregation as best I can." I was ever so proud to be serving as pastor of those assembled that day!

The only downfall about last Sunday's Voters' Assembly was the absence of some of you who could have, and should have, been there. This was noticeable to all gathered and was brought up several times during the meeting. People were both saddened and frustrated that some of you seem to have chosen a nonparticipatory approach with the congregation to which you belong. Please understand that this is not in reference to those of you who could not be there, but in reference to those of you who chose not to be there. What I found impressive was that, amidst the sadness and frustration expressed concerning your absence, there was also a very real desire among your brothers and sisters to have you there. In fact, the true Christian spirit I referenced above was further seen by the fact that the feeling among most was that we need to take your feelings into consideration, even though you chose not to be there to express them, and proceed

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with caution. This is, in large part, why, at the end of the day, the assembly approved a no-increase budget for 2009, instead of the proposed budget originally publicized.

From a pastoral point of view, I am not as concerned about the fact that some of you have chosen not to participate as I am about what the reasons may be that have led you to that choice, and what that might mean for your spiritual welfare. Let me just say, right up front, that the Word of God does not provide any legitimate reasons for choosing not to participate among, and/or support, the congregation to which you belong, unless, of course, that congregation has abandoned the true Word of God. In that case, however, you would leave that congregation and seek out fellowship with a congregation where the true Word of God was preached and taught, not stick around, refusing to participate. And, again, just so I am vividly clear, I am not addressing those of you who are unable, but those of you who have willfully and knowingly made this choice. Be aware that you do not have any Scriptural foundation upon which to stand in this matter. God's Word is vividly clear: Christians serve and support the ministry and mission of their Lord in the congregations in which He has placed them. Withholding your participation and/or support is never an option for a Christian; it is always sinful and, thus, always displeasing to the Lord.

If you have been guilty of this, there is only one faithful option for you, and that is to repent. Turn from your wicked ways and return to the Lord in faith. The good news is that He stands ready to take you back. He wills to embrace you and remember your sins no more. He is good, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love. The bad news is that if you refuse to repent, you are keeping yourself outside of His grace and mercy and are in very real danger of Hell. Remember, and heed, the Lord's warning: "On that Day, many will say to Me, 'Lord, Lord' . . . And I will declare to them, 'I never knew you; depart from Me, you workers of lawlessness" (cf. Matt. 7:21-23). You cannot be a pretend Christian. The Lord knows who belongs to Him and who doesn't. Do not think that you can willfully and knowingly withhold your participation and/or support from Him and remain in His grace. It does not work that way. Be warned. Repent!


It may not seem like it, but I write this to those of you to whom it applies in Christian love. My sincere hope and prayer is that you will prayerfully consider these things, for I am convinced that doing so will lead you to repentance and faith. Whatever your reasons have been for withholding your participation and support, it is time to cease and desist from treading down that wicked path. Whatever your reasons have been, it is time to confront them and seek to overcome them, so that you may be the faithful servant of the Lord He has chosen you to be. If you have issues with me; if you're mad at me for something I've done or said, then let's talk about it and seek after reconciliation. If you have issues with other brothers and sisters, then talk to them and seek after reconciliation. That's what Christians do! They communicate with one another, confronting their brothers and sisters in Christ, whom they feel have sinned against them, with the hope of being reconciled to one another. To refuse to do so, to remain angry and hold grudges, and to put your anger and grudge-holding into action by withholding your participation and support, is not Christian.

For my part, I know I have failed in many ways as the pastor here at Peace. I have made more than my fair share of mistakes. I have done things I should not have done and said things I should not have said. I often wonder what in the world the Lord must have been thinking by calling and ordaining me to serve as a pastor. The fact that He has is proof that He certainly does work in mysterious ways. My biggest failure has been the way in which I have approached conflict when it has arisen. I have not been persistent enough. I have tried to arrange meetings with those who have had issues, but have allowed them to brush me off. I should have kept after them more, but I chose to back off, hoping that time would heal those wounds. That hasn't worked, and it's my fault. I have been serving in the church long enough (many moons before I was ever called to be a pastor) to know that the "allow them time to get over it" approach hardly ever works. Thus, I pledge to be more persistent from this time forth.

Along these same lines, it has been suggested that I try to visit with every member/family in our congregation this year, taking along that member's/family's elder. This is a good suggestion and one that the elders and I will do our best to fulfill. So, if you get a call from Mary Jakolat in the weeks and months to come trying to arrange a time for your elder and I to visit you, do not fear. The purpose of these visits will simply be to touch base and make sure all is well with you.

Lastly, what we learned this past Sunday was that we have many challenges facing our congregation. Will we be able to meet those challenges? With us this is impossible, but with God all things are possible. I am very optimistic about our future. I have never belonged to a congregation where I have witnessed the level of faithfulness I have seen here at Peace. I am constantly blown away by the selfless love and generosity put on display by so many of you. The Holy Spirit is definitely at work among us, and when that is the case, blessings shall follow. The Lord will provide in His way and in His time. He always does. He is always faithful to His promises, and, thus, we have nothing to fear. His will be done, whatever that may be. It is always good! Amen!

You endured great shame, were spit upon and mocked, pierced with thorns, nails, and spear all for me, and yet I have often lived as though none of it mattered. Forgive me, Lord, and use this holy season of Lent to enliven my faith and bring me closer to You. In Your Holy and Precious Name. Amen.

"O Sacred Head, Now Wounded" (LSB 449)

O sacred Head, now wounded, With grief and shame weighed down, Now scornfully surrounded With thorns, Thine only crown. O sacred Head, what glory, What bliss, till now was Thine! Yet, though despised and gory, I joy to call Thee mine.

What Thou, my Lord, hast suffered Was all for sinners' gain; Mine, mine was the transgression, But Thine the deadly pain. Lo, here I fall, my Savior! 'Tis I deserve Thy place; Look on me with Thy favor, And grant to me Thy grace.

What language shall I borrow To thank Thee, dearest Friend, For this Thy dying sorrow, Thy pity without end? O make me Thine forever! And should I fainting be, Lord, let me never, never, Outlive my love for Thee.

Be Thou my consolation, My shield, when I must die; Remind me of Thy passion When my last hour draws nigh. Mine eyes shall then behold Thee, Upon Thy cross shall dwell, My heart by faith enfold Thee. Who dieth thus does well.

Thoughts on the Most Holy Eucharist

We believe, teach, and confess with the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic church established by Christ Himself, that in, with, and under the bread and wine, we are given to eat and to drink the very Body and Blood of Christ during the administration of the Most Holy Eucharist. This demands our utmost reverence and adoration. As Dr. Luther put it:

"It is the Word, I say, that makes and sets this Sacrament apart. So it is not mere bread and wine, but is, and is called, Christ's body and blood (1 Cor. 11:23-27). For it is said, "When the Word is joined to the element or natural substance, it becomes a Sacrament." This saying of St. Augustine is so properly and so well put that he has scarcely said anything better. The Word must make a Sacrament out of the element, or else it remains a mere element. Now, it is not the word or ordinance of a prince or emperor. But it is the Word of the grand Majesty, *at whose feet all creatures should fall and affirm it is as He says, and accept it with all reverence, fear, and humility* (Isaiah 45:23; Philippians 2:10)." — Luther's Large Catechism, V.11 [Emphasis mine]

It is for this reason that, after the Consecration of the elements, the pastor elevates them and genuflects (bows) before them. They are no longer merely bread and wine, but have been joined by the very Body and Blood of Christ, which demands our "reverence, fear, and humility," as Dr. Luther says.

As we approach the altar to receive the Sacrament, we must do so in that same "reverence, fear, and humility." To do so means that we acknowledge that Christ is present, but also that we have taken His Word seriously and have examined ourselves to make sure that we come to His altar as those who are truly sorry for their sins and desire to amend their lives. Those who come to the altar without contrition (sorrow over sin) and have no desire to amend their sinful ways receive the Lord's Body and Blood not to their benefit, but to their judgment and great harm. As Dr. Luther put it, "This is not child's play! God cannot be mocked!" We need to take this very seriously. In order to help us in that regard, what follows is an exhortation to communicants, authored by two of our most faithful Lutheran forefathers, Martin Chemnitz and Jacob Andreae:

An Exhortation to Communicants

Since from the fall and trespass of our first parents, Adam and Eve, we have all fallen into sin and are guilty of everlasting death, and through such sin have grown weak and corrupted in both body and soul, so that we of ourselves can do no good thing, much less keep the commandments and will of God, and since according to the Law we are cursed and ought to be eternally damned, as it is written in the book of the Law, and though neither we ourselves nor any other creature in heaven or on earth could help us out of such sorrow and condemnation, God the Almighty has had mercy upon us.

Out of his inexpressible love, he has sent his own Son, Jesus Christ, into this world to take our nature upon Him, taking flesh and blood from the Virgin Mary. On Him were laid our sins and those of the whole world. He bore them for us as on the gallows of the cross He died, and on the third day he rose again, having atoned for our sin and that of our parents, again reconciling us to God the Almighty, so that we are now justified, made children of God, and will have eternal life and salvation.

That we may be sure of this and never forget His great, inexpressible love and kindness, Jesus Christ, as He was about to begin his sufferings, instituted His Supper, giving to His beloved disciples His own body to eat and His blood to drink and said to them - and to all Christians - that it is His body given for them and His blood shed for them, for the forgiveness of sins, and that as often as they eat and drink of it, they should do so for His remembrance and, as St. Paul says, to proclaim His death until He comes again on the Last Day as judge of the living and the dead.

Therefore we are to do as he has commanded us, that is, to eat his body and drink his blood, remembering and giving thanks for His great kindness in reconciling us to God the heavenly Father, and rescuing us from sin, death, and eternal damnation. We ought also believe what He has said. Namely, "This is My body, given for you; This is My blood, shed for you, for the forgiveness of sins." When we do as He bids us and believe, we receive according to His word His true body with the bread and His true blood with the wine, and with them all His merits and righteousness: that is, forgiveness of sins, deliverance from death, the adoption as children, and eternal salvation.

But let only those who hunger and thirst for righteousness go to this most holy sacrament; that is, those who confess their sins, are sorry for them, and who have the intention to do better, and as far as possible live according to God's will. Therefore, let a man examine himself, and if he finds such a disposition go the sacrament boldly, for he receives it worthily. And though he is weak, yet still believing, let him go to the sacrament. God will have patience. "A bruised reed he will not break and a dimly burning wick he will not quench." He is pleased with but the beginning of faith. Yet we should pray as in the Gospel: "Lord, I believe! Help thou mine unbelief." But whoever is not sorry for his sins and has no intention of bettering himself, but plans to continue in open sin and lust, let him stay away from the sacrament, for he receives it to his judgment, as St. Paul says.

Now then, as we are gathered together to observe the Supper of our Lord and to receive His body and blood, in order that we may do so worthily, that our faith may be strengthened, that we might live more according to God's will, that we might forgive our enemies and love our neighbors and do good to all, let us call on God our Father through Jesus Christ and pray together the holy Our Father . . . [From the *Braunschweig-Wölfenbüttel Kirchen Ordnung*, authored by Chemnitz and Andreae]

STEWARDSHIP AT PEACE

Dear Members of Peace,

In light of our current financial hardship here at Peace, I am compelled to encourage us all to get to the heart of the matter. Eph. 4 v. 22-24 says, "You were taught with regard to your former way of life, to put off your old self, which is being corrupted by its deceitful desires, to be made new in the attitude of your minds; and to put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness." How does this apply to giving? What is, "the new attitude of your mind?" What should our attitude be towards giving?

Giving to the Lord is merely returning to Him what is already His. In doing so, we put our complete trust and faith in Him, not in our money. We are to do this freely, cheerfully, and with thanksgiving in our hearts. Knowing all the while that we are not giving to Peace, or the evangelism committee, or any other part of our church, but that we are giving to God alone. Proper giving is about having the proper attitude.

So, if we as a church only give when and where we see fit, we are putting ourselves first, and that is dangerous. We are not trusting that God will put our money to work according to His superior will, and therefore lose sight of His love and promises. If we are afraid that tithing is going to leave us high and dry, then we need to go back to His Word and be reminded of His promises to bless us. This is not meant to discourage members from giving to specific needs as they arise, so long as it's above and beyond their regular offering/tithe.

We have a defined mission, a Pastor who cares, and many willing and talented members. To me, it is sad that we are only able to make ends meet, and are thus unable to participate in the mission field the way we ought. It is time for us to seriously consider our attitudes. Then, in the spirit of God's grace through Christ, to move forward together so that the Lord's will may be accomplished through us here in Alma and beyond.

ABOUT THE SPREADSHEET ON THE FOLLOWING PAGE

I have provided the following spreadsheet to give us all a sense of not only where we fall in how much we give back to the Lord, but to provide goals that would allow us to meet the budgetary needs of the church in order that God's will might be carried out through us

If you look at the first bold line, the 6 in the first column means that this row shows the 6th highest offering. The third column shows that the top six givers gave \$52,118.84, which is 49.01% (fourth column) of the total offerings (\$106,335.58). The fifth column shows that those 6 envelopes makes up 10.53% of the 57 active envelopes. In other words, the top 10% of our givers gave 49% of the total offerings. Looking at the next bold lines, we see the top 32% accounted for 81% of our total offerings, and the top 44% accounted for 90% of our total offerings. There are, of course, several people below that line who are faithfully giving as much as they can, and I do not intend to undermine their faithful offerings to the Lord, but many of us should certainly be giving more to the Lord.

In bold at the bottom left corner, you can see the amount of reserve funds we have remaining. If we continue to borrow \$14,079.39 from those funds each year, we will run out in 5.31 years. So, how can we make up that \$14,000? That's where the last three columns come in. The third column from the right shows the average amount given per week for each envelope. The next column shows the same amount plus \$5. Looking at the bottom of that column, you can see that if we all gave just \$5 more each week, we would more than make up what we were short in 2008. Furthermore, looking at the last column, if we all gave \$7 more each week, we could have a surplus of about \$6,000 (\$20,748 - \$14,079 = \$6,669), and we could finally start to increase our mission contributions.

My hope is that you will seriously and prayerfully consider this small increase in your weekly offerings. Together, we can all make a big difference.


