"Why It Matters!"

Why are some pastors so concerned with maintaining sound doctrine and practice? Shouldn't they be more concerned about filling the pews and saving the lost? Don't they realize that the church must change and become more culturally relevant if it is going to survive? Don't they realize that the only way to grow the church is to make the church more appealing to outsiders? Don't they realize that their stubborn insistence on maintaining pure and sound doctrine and practice stands in the way of reaching the lost?

It used to be that these kinds of questions were asked by Christians belonging to churches of Protestant denominations (or non-denominations), but such is no longer the case. In our day and age, these questions are being asked by Lutherans, and even by those who claim to be conservative, or confessional, Lutherans.

There is a growing trend within our own LCMS to forsake sound doctrine and practice in order to become more "culturally relevant." Those who support this trend argue that our synod must "change with the times" if it is going to survive. They claim that our number one priority should not be maintaining sound doctrine and practice, but reaching the lost for Jesus Christ. In fact, they go one step further and make the claim that those who insist on maintaining sound doctrine and practice

not only have their priorities out of order, but lack the heart for saving lost sinners. After all, if these stubborn pastors (and laypeople) truly had the heart for saving lost sinners, they would be more flexible regarding doctrine and practice.

Our current Synodical President, Rev. Dr. Gerald B. Kieschnick, has stated publicly time and time again that he believes we need to stop "wasting time" on "incessant internal purification" (which is just a fancy way of saying "maintaining sound doctrine and practice") and start focusing on the lost:

"[The LCMS] cannot afford to waste time on incessant internal purification at the expense of the lost in the world." (http://www.lutheranchurch.ca/synod2002/frigreetings.html).

"We have not the luxury of time and energy spent on incessant internal purification at the expense of the eternal destiny of the souls of men and women for whom Christ died, but who know not His name and have accepted not His saving grace." (http://www.lcms.org/graphics/assets/media/CT CR/president_greetings.pdf)

"My concern is that we can spend so much time in incessant internal purification that we do so at the expense of the eternal destiny of people who are dying every minute" (http://www.wfn.org/2002/12/msg00199.html)

"People, this is not a game. Our incessant internal purification at the expense of the eternal destiny of the souls of men and women for whom Christ died must stop!" (http://www.jesusfirst.net/2002aug04.htm)

All of these statements, upon first glance, may sound well and good. And, they are

no doubt motivated by a sincere desire within President Kieschnick to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ with the lost. But, these statements fall woefully short when analyzed against Holy Scripture, our Lutheran Confessions, and LCMS history, for statements presuppose "incessant internal purification" (maintaining sound doctrine and practice) and "reaching the lost" are mutually exclusive, as if the one gets in the way of the other. On the contrary, the exact opposite is true: It is only through sound doctrine and practice that the lost are truly reached!

Far from being a "waste of time," the

Synopsis of April 10, 2007 Church Council Minutes

Date: April 10, 2007

Time: 7:00 p.m.

Call To Order & Opening Prayer - President Jakolat called the meeting to order at 7:00pm. Dave Zeile conducted the opening prayer in the absence of Pastor Messer. The following members were present: Vern Jakolat, Miguel Ortiz, Megan Brown, Carol Zeile, Dave Zeile, Bill Brostrom, Sharyn Greening, Larry Elliott and Dick Kohler. Members absent: Coaline Luplow, Pastor Messer.

Approval of Agenda - The following items were added to the agenda: Addition of Budget & Finance Committee under Organization and Committee Reports, Addition of Saginaw Valley Lutheran Hour Fund under Old Business, Addition of Piano Tuning and General Comment under New Business

Christian Church must constantly engage in "incessant internal purification." This is the very charge given to the Church by our Lord throughout Scripture. You will not find one example anywhere in Scripture which supports the notion that flexibility in doctrine and practice is needed to reach the lost. Instead, Scripture, from beginning to end, consistently exhorts the people of God to "stand firm on His Word" (cf. Ex. 14:13; Ps. 20:8; Prov. 10:25; Matt. 10:22, 24:13; Luke 21:19; 1 Cor. 15:58, 16:13; 2 Cor. 1:21, 24; Gal. 5:1; Eph. 6:14; Php. 1:27, 4:1; Col. 4:12; 1 Th. 3:8; 2 Th. 2:15; Ja. 5:8; 1 Pet. 5:9; Rev. 2-3).

The very history of the Israelites and of the early church recorded for us in Scripture should eliminate any suggestion that calls for us to compromise our doctrine and practice in order to make it more appealing to the sinful world. How could we possibly miss this lesson? When is it that the Israelites get in trouble with God? Whenever they abandon His Word and His Way and conform to the pagan world around them. This happens over and over again. God calls them to be His chosen people, gives them His salvation, and commands them to stand firm in His Word. For a while, they do. Everything is great. But, then, when they get comfortable, they begin to go astray by conforming to the surrounding pagan culture. Does God ever say, "Well done, O Israelites! I'm so glad you are no longer concerned with incessant internal purification. What a joy it is to see you conforming to the world around you!"? Never! Instead, God sends prophets into their midst to call them to repentance. The message of all the prophets is the same: "Stop conforming to the sinful world around you! Repent and return to the Lord lest you receive the judgment of God upon your sin!" But, just like today, only a small remnant among the Israelites heeded the call of the prophets to repent and return to the Lord. The vast majority did not. Instead, they ridiculed and mocked, persecuted, and even killed the prophets. "You silly prophets! You're so wrapped up in incessant internal purification that you don't realize the great success we have had in making our religion more culturally relevant! Just look at how our religion has grown. We have learned how to incorporate the rituals and customs of our neighbors into our religion while still remaining true to Yahweh. Either learn how to adapt as we have or leave us alone!" And, when the prophets didn't leave them alone, what did they do? They banished or killed them.

We learn the same lesson from the early church established by our Lord through His apostles. The majority of the New Testament is made up of letters (or epistles) written by the apostles (mostly by St. Paul) to specific congregations urging them to return to the doctrine and practice they were taught by the apostles when they were established. Just like the Israelites, these congregations began on solid ground, being called and established by the Lord through His Word as it was preached to them by the apostles. But, over time, they began to conform to the sinful world around them. So, the Holy Spirit inspires the apostles to write them letters warning them to repent and return to the Lord. Far from allowing for flexibility in doctrine and practice, the message is clear throughout: "Steer clear of worldly influence and false teachers and cling to the pure Gospel of Jesus Christ!"

Our Lutheran Confessions, which are nothing more than faithful expositions of the doctrines taught in Holy Scripture, were written in the spirit of Luther's famous refusal to recant at the Diet of Worms: "Here I stand! I can do no other. So help me God. Amen!" As with Holy Scripture, they do not allow for flexibility of doctrine and practice for the purpose of making it more appealing to the world. They are clear, bold, and firm statements of faith. They declare: "This is what Scripture teaches and what we believe! Period!" They even go further by declaring what Scripture does not teach and what we do not believe by condemning the teachings of other Christians. How anyone could possibly read our Confessions and conclude that it is okay for us to borrow doctrines and practices from those Christians our Confessions condemn is completely beyond me!

Given the clear teaching of Holy Scripture which we boldly confess in our Lutheran Confessions, it truly is an amazing thing that there is such an outcry in our synod today for changing our doctrine and practice in order to make it more appealing to the world. This was not always the case. Our synod used to stand firm on the Word of God and our Lutheran Confessions. We used to say very clearly and boldly to the world around us, "Here we stand! We can do no other. So help us God. Amen!" It used to be simply unthinkable that we would allow the doctrines and practices of other Christians into our midst. We used to be wholly committed to maintaining sound doctrine and practice and the idea that doing so would prevent us from reaching the lost was simply absurd. If you think I'm overstating the case, simply compare the following statements of C.F.W. Walther, the first LCMS President, with the statements of our current President quoted earlier:

"Many say, 'Instead of disputing over doctrine so much, we should much rather be concerned with souls and with leading them to Christ.' But all who speak in this way do not really know what they are saying or what they are doing. As foolish as it would be to scold a farmer for being concerned about sowing good seed and to demand of him simply to be concerned about a good harvest, so foolish it is to scold those who are concerned first and foremost with the doctrine, and to demand of them that they should

rather seek to rescue souls. For just as the farmer who wants a good crop must first of all be concerned about good seed, so the church must above all be concerned about right doctrine if it would save souls." (http://www.concordtx.org/vision.htm)

"Whether our Synod gains friends or makes enemies, wins honor or invites disgrace, grows or declines in numbers, brings peace or incites enmity, all this must be unimportant to us--just so our Synod may keep the jewel of purity of doctrine and knowledge. However, should our Synod ever grow indifferent toward purity of doctrine, through ingratitude forget this prize, or betray or barter it away to the false church, then let our church body perish and the name 'Missourian' decay in disgrace." (http://www.ctsfw.edu/library/files/pb/1517)

"Oh my dear friends of the Lutheran faith, confession, and conflict, do not be misled when today those are everywhere accused of lovelessness who still do not give up the battle for pure doctrine in our Church. . . . Oh my dear friends, let us indeed sorrow and lament over this: that false teachers constantly assail the pure doctrine in our Church and thus are at fault for the conflict and strife in the Church. However, let us never lament but rather extol and praise God that he always awakens men who fight against those false teachers . . . This conflict is one commanded us by God and is therefore certainly one blessed in time and in eternity. . . . Oh, therefore, let us never listen to those who praise and extol the conflict of the Reformation for the pure Gospel but want to know nothing of a similar conflict in our days." (http://scotchisforlutherans.blogspot.com/2004/05/from-cat41.html)

For Walther, there was nothing more important than to "battle for pure doctrine in our Church." Why? Because he knew the Scriptures and he subscribed unconditionally to our Lutheran Confessions. He knew the truth, that it is only through sound doctrine and practice that sinners are brought to, and sustained in, the one true faith. To claim that "incessant internal purification" is a "waste of time" and gets in the way of "reaching the lost" was "foolish" to him. "All who speak in this way do not really know what they are saying or what they are doing." Walther knew that people who make such claims think they are "reaching the lost" when they repackage the Gospel in a way that is more appealing to the world so that people will "join the church," but they are not. They may be adding to their church membership, but they are not making disciples of Christ. Instead, by watering down their doctrine and practice, they are making "watered-down" Christians who fail to realize that Christianity is about much more than saying, "I believe in Jesus," and attending church once in a while. Christianity is a way of life. Yes, it is true that we are saved by grace alone, through faith alone, in Christ alone, but faith is, in the words of Luther, "a living, active thing," That "living, active" faith is delivered as a precious gift into the hearts of sinners by the Holy Spirit through the pure preaching of the Gospel (not some watered-down, compromising, worldly, culturally-relevant Gospel) and the right administration of the Holy Sacraments according to Christ's institution (not according to the institution of those false Christians who promote their empty, powerless, and meaningless non-sacraments). That is why there is nothing more important for the Christian Church than to maintain sound doctrine and practice. The Christian Church must defend sound doctrine and practice at all costs, defending it to the death if need be!

Pastors are especially charged with this task. Three of St. Paul's epistles are known as "The Pastoral Epistles" (1 & 2 Timothy, Titus), since they are written primarily to, and for, pastors. The main theme throughout these epistles is that pastors must "fight the good fight of the faith" (1 Tim. 6:12a) by always teaching "what is in accord with sound doctrine" (Tit. 2:1). St. Paul makes it vividly clear that pastors must never grow indifferent regarding doctrine and practice, but must constantly be on guard for "deceiving spirits and things taught by demons" (1 Tim. 4:1). A pastor must always "preach the Word; be prepared in season and out of season; correct, rebuke, and encourage—with great patience and careful instruction" (2 Tim. 4:2). Why? Because "the time will come when men will not put up with sound doctrine. Instead, to suit their own desires, they will gather around them a great number of teachers to say what their itching ears want to hear. They will turn their ears away from the truth and turn aside to myths" (2 Tim. 4:3-4).

That "time" St. Paul warns about has arrived full force, my friends. We live in a time when many Christians could care less about sound doctrine. It just simply doesn't matter to them. They view the Christian Church as nothing more than a social club. They are not concerned with what a Church believes and confesses, but rather with what kind of "worship style" and what kinds of "programs" the Church offers. They want a Church that "suits their own desires" and "teachers who say what their itching ears want to hear." They want a "fun and exciting" Church, one that is not bogged down in the past, but is "new and innovative," providing them with an "entertaining worship experience." They want pastors who make them "feel good" about themselves with uplifting, "motivational messages," not one who preaches Law and Gospel sermons. In short, they want to have their Christianity their way, according to their wants and desires. Sound doctrine and practice means nothing to them. Just give them their "fast food" version of Christianity and they are perfectly content!

For this reason, because this kind of "have-it-your-way" Christianity surrounds us today, now, more than ever, we in the LCMS must "battle for pure doctrine," as Walther says. But, sadly, instead, many in our synod have taken an "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em" approach. The thought process is this: People no longer care about sound doctrine and practice. The only way we can reach them is by changing our doctrine and practice so that it is more appealing to them. Therefore, we must change to "meet people where they are" and to fulfill their "felt needs" because, after all, it doesn't matter "how" we reach the lost as long as we reach them.

The results of this "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em" approach is seen throughout our synod today. You never know what you're going to find when visiting an LCMS congregation anymore. In many, you will find the altar pushed to the side of the chancel area to make room for the "Praise Band" which leads the congregation in singing contemporary "Christian praise songs" which endorse and teach false doctrines. In many, the historic liturgy has been abandoned in favor of more contemporary "worship formats" which omit such things as Confession and Absolution, the Creed, the Lord's Prayer, etc. Many congregations practice open Communion, inviting any and all baptized Christians to the Holy Supper, regardless of denominational affiliation. Many have women elders, lectors (readers), and Communion Assistants. Many have pastors who lead the Service in plain clothing, and on and on. Surely, anything goes in today's LCMS. You can even preach a Lenten Sermon Series on "How to Have Great Sex" or sing the Words of Institution to the tune of "Yankee Doodle Dandy." And, all of this, we are told by our current leadership and by many others in the LCMS, is to be seen as "blessed diversity."

This is not "blessed diversity!" It is blatant proof that our synod has grown "indifferent toward purity of doctrine" and has, in many ways, "betrayed and bartered it away to the false church," and, sadly, the name "Missourian" is slowly "decaying in disgrace." Walther wouldn't make it in today's LCMS. Neither would Luther. In the spirit of St. Paul, they would preach, "You foolish Lutherans! Who has bewitched you? You were running a good race! Who cut in on you and kept you from obeying the truth? That kind of persuasion does not come from Him who called you. Have you forgotten that a little yeast works through the whole batch of dough? Repent! Return to the pure Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ by which you were called!" (cf. Galatians). But, I dare say that they would be treated like the prophets of old. Many in our synod would (and do) respond to such preaching like the majority of the Israelites did back then: "You silly preachers! You're so wrapped up in incessant internal purification that you don't realize the great success we have had in making our synod more culturally relevant! Just look at how some of our 'leading' congregations are growing. We have learned how to incorporate the principles of the Church Growth Movement taught and promoted by our neighbors, the Protestant Americanized Evangelicals, while still remaining true to our Lutheran faith. Either learn how to adapt as we have or leave us alone!" And, when Walther and Luther would not leave them alone (and, believe me, they would not leave them alone!), they would be promptly removed from the LCMS clergy roster (as many faithful LCMS pastors have been).

Dear friends in Christ, I began this lengthy article with a series of questions, the first of which was, "Why are some pastors so concerned with maintaining sound doctrine and practice?" I am writing this to you because I know some of you have asked similar questions about me, especially in the last few months as we have been discussing our practice of using individual cups in the Distribution of our Lord's Holy Blood during the Holy Supper. Some of you have said that you just can't understand why I would even bring this up. I've heard things like, "What's the big deal? Why does this matter?" These are legitimate questions that should be asked. The fact that they are asked does not upset me in the least and I am more than happy to answer these questions. But, the question I have for some of you is, "Are you asking these questions honestly desiring an answer?" or "Are these questions really nothing more than statements of your own personal belief?" In other words, are you really asking, "What's the big deal? Why does this matter?" or are you really stating what you personally believe, "This should not be a big deal! This shouldn't matter!"

In either case, my answer is the same: This DOES matter. We should ALWAYS be at the business of analyzing our doctrine and practice to make sure that it is sound; that it conforms to Scripture and our Lutheran Confessions, not to the "yeast" of worldly appeal or popular demand. This is what defines us as Confessional Lutherans. It's what differentiates us from the "have-it-yourway" Protestant Americanized Evangelical "Christianity" that permeates our society today.

I hope and pray that what I have written here at least begins to explain why this particular pastor is so "stubborn" when it comes to our doctrine and practice here at Peace. It is solely because I believe with the prophets and apostles, with Luther and Walther, and with a great many faithful Confessional Lutheran pastors in our day, that our Lord calls pastors and laity alike to "remain steadfast in His Word" and to avoid worldly influence and false teachers; that it is only through sound, biblically-correct (not politically-correct) doctrine and practice that lost sinners are brought to, and sustained in, the one true faith that delivers forgiveness, life, and salvation in the Name of our great God and Savior, Jesus the Christ!






I pray that we will have the opportunity to worship this way during Holy Week next year and that many members of our congregation will be able to take part.
