From the Desk of Pastor Messer

"With the Highest Reverence"

Dearly beloved in Christ,

Holy worship in God's Holy House is, well, Holy. That should go without saying, but, unfortunately, in our day and age, it needs to be said. It seems many Christians, including many Christians within the Lutheran branch of Christendom, have forgotten what worship really is. It is not simply an informal gathering of people in a building to sing a few hymns, say a few prayers, and listen to God's Word proclaimed. It is, rather, a Holy Encounter with our Holy Lord in His Holy House. It is where our Lord Himself comes to be present with us. It is when our Lord fulfills His promise to be with us always, as He comes into our midst to gift us with forgiveness, life, and salvation through His Holy Word and Sacraments.

Our Lord is with us in the Divine Service, my friends. REALLY with us! And, that fact, which is attested by Holy Scripture time and time again, demands our respect and reverence. This is not optional. We do not get to enter the Lord's House and do as we please. The Divine Service is not a time for us to have fun and "get down with Jesus," as many today falsely believe. It is a time for us to come, at our Lord's gracious invitation, into His Holy House to have our sins forgiven, our lives renewed, our faith strengthened and preserved, and our salvation secured.

The Divine Service is Christ-centered and Cross-focused. It is Liturgical, Sacramental, and Confessional. It is formal, ceremonial, orderly, and reverent. It is not a time for flippancy and nonchalance. We are on Holy Ground in the Divine Service. We are in the presence of our Lord. If ever there was a time for reverence, this is surely it!

For that reason, our Lutheran forefathers were very careful to

make clear: "Our churches are falsely accused of abolishing the Mass (i.e. Divine Service). The Mass is held among us and celebrated with *the highest reverence*" (Augsburg Confession, Article XIV—emphasis mine). And, again: "At the outset, we must again make this preliminary statement: we do not abolish the Mass, but religiously keep and defend it. Masses are celebrated among us *every Lord's Day and on the other festivals*. The Sacrament is offered to those who wish to use it, after they have been examined and absolved. And the *usual public ceremonies are observed*, the series of lessons, of prayers, vestments, and other such things" (Apology, Article XIV—emphases mine).

Contrary to what seems to be an ever growing popular belief among those claiming to be Lutherans, our Confessions (the very documents which define Lutheranism!) make it vividly clear that Lutheran worship is done with the highest reverence, the Lord's Supper is celebrated every Sunday and on Feast Days, and the customs and traditions (i.e., "the usual public ceremonies") are retained among us. It was never the intention of our Lutheran forefathers to start a new church. It was never their intention to do away with the salutary customs and traditions which had been handed down to them through the years. The Lutheran Reformation was not pragmatic or innovative, but purely theological. It sought to correct the abuses which had crept into the Church over time and to restore the Gospel of Jesus Christ to the center of all the Church says and does. It sought not to be a new and improved version of the Church, but to restore the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church established by our Lord Jesus Himself.

Sadly, over time, especially as Lutheranism made its way to America and fell under the influence of Americanized

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protestants, Lutherans began to drift away from their roots. Enamored by the apparent "success" of the Americanized protestants, Lutherans began to adopt practices that would surely result in their Lutheran forefathers turning over in their graves. A growing "Romaphobia" crept in (which, make no mistake about it, was the result of flirting with the protestants, who detested any and all things they perceived to be related to the Roman Catholic Church) and Lutherans began purposely doing away with many of the things their own Confessions claim to "religiously keep and defend." Many ancient and salutary customs and traditions, which were practiced in the Church long before Roman Catholicism ever came on the scene, were eliminated from Lutheran practice, such as making the sign of the cross, bowing, chanting, kneeling, genuflecting, elevating the consecrated Host and Chalice, etc. The Mass (i.e. Divine Service) was no longer celebrated with "the highest reverence" and the "usual public ceremonies" were no longer observed. Over time, Lutherans came to believe that what made them Lutherans was their refusal to do what their own Confessions said they did. How strange is that?

As Lutherans fell further and further away from what their own definitive Confessions taught, for many years they at least maintained some sense of unity in doctrine and practice. As near as thirty to forty years ago, it was a pretty safe bet that one could attend any congregation within our own synod and feel right at home. While there may not have been "the highest reverence" and while the "usual public ceremonies" may not have been observed, the liturgy and hymnody was still there, along with the vestments, candles, and such. Not so anymore. Not even close. Sadly, what Forrest Gump proclaimed about life has come true about our own beloved synod: "The LCMS is like a box of chocolates; you never know what yer gonna git."

You could walk into a number of LCMS congregations next Sunday and find the pastor leading a "worship experience" in his jeans and a t-shirt, the altar removed to make room for the "praise band," Christian "rock and roll" pounding forth with people dancing to the beat, "chancel dramas" or video presentations replacing the sermon, and on and on. Surely, anything goes in our synod today.

Dear friends, this is the inevitable result of our falling away from our Confessions many, many years ago. The more Lutherans strayed from what they claimed to believe, teach, and confess, the more susceptible they became to the plethora of tomfoolery we see happening in our midst today. The more Lutherans adopted the practices of Americanized

protestants, the more they actually became like them, to the point that the only thing that distinguishes many congregations in our own synod today from Americanized protestants is the name on their sign out front (and even that is not present among some).

So, what's the point of all this? It is simply to state most emphatically that what is needed among Lutherans today is a reformation. We need to get back to our roots. We need to be who we confess we are. We need to get back to being the people who confess: "The Mass is held among us and celebrated with the highest reverence." Why? Because that confession is made with the theology of worship revealed to us in Holy Scripture in full view. People can try as they will to twist the Scriptures so that they promote the idea that Christian worship can be informal and irreverent, "fun and exciting," and so on, but the simple truth of the matter is that you will not find one example of God's people engaging in this kind of "worship" in Scripture. Not ONE! Worship in God's Holy Word is ALWAYS reverent. The very word which we translate, "worship," in both the Hebrew and Greek of Scripture literally means, "to fall prostrate in reverence."

Of course, reformation is never easy in the Church. People don't usually react very well to change, even if that change involves nothing more than getting back to the place from which we should have never strayed. This is especially true among Lutherans, or so it seems. The old joke goes: How many Lutherans does it take to change a light bulb? And the answer, of course, is: Change?!!!

All joking aside, there seems, in my humble opinion, to be at least three identifiable obstacles to a substantive reformation among Lutherans happening today:

1) The "We've Never Done That Before" Syndrome. The older Lutherans among us, who may not be fans of the contemporary, "happy-clappy" stuff being promoted more and more today, are nevertheless reluctant to accept the re-introduction of many customs and traditions that should have never fell out of practice, but unfortunately did. An illustration: When I was on vicarage, I remember visiting a very sweet lady named Arlene. She was one of our shut-ins who resided in the Lutheran Home. She was 90 years old and a life-long Lutheran. She spoke fluent German and could even recite much of the Small Catechism from memory in German. As I was leading a devotion with her, we came to the Apostle's Creed and recited it together. As the Creed concluded, I made the sign of the cross at the words, "and the life +

everlasting," as is customary. Arlene said, quite bluntly, "Please don't do that, vicar." "What's that?" I asked. "That sign of the cross thingy. It gives me the creeps. It's too Roman Catholic." I tried to explain to her that this custom goes back to apostolic times, long before Roman Catholicism came on the scene. I even had her open her German Small Catechism to read how Martin Luther himself urges us to make the sign of the cross during our morning and evening prayers. That caught her attention a bit, but she still wasn't budging. She had been formed by 90 years of practice which taught her that making the sign of the cross was not something Lutherans did; more than that, that making the sign of the cross was something Lutherans purposely avoided, so as to steer clear of Roman Catholicism. So it is with many of our elderly Lutheran brothers and sisters. They have been so long without many of the salutary customs and traditions we Lutherans confess to religiously keep and defend that they find them very difficult, if not impossible, to accept. "We've never done that before," they say. And, the sad thing is, they're just speaking the truth.

- 2) The growing disunity and divergence in practice plaguing our synod today. It is very difficult to convince people that the true theology of worship to which we Lutherans confess to adhere involves "the highest reverence" and employs the "usual public ceremonies" when there are other Lutheran pastors down the road teaching them otherwise. Our synod has sadly become a virtual smorgasbord of competing ideologies in which people can choose for themselves which pastors and congregations suit their fancies best. Why should you listen to Pastor Messer when Pastor so-and-so says it's okay to "worship" like the methabapticostals? course, the solution to this little dilemma is readily available to one and all, namely to search the Scriptures and our Confessions for yourselves to see whether Pastor Messer's or Pastor so-and-so's teachings are in line with That, by the way, is exactly what our Lord teaches us to do in His Word. As St. John says, "Beloved, do not believe every spirit, but test the spirits to see whether they are from God, for many false prophets have gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1). But, this leads us to the third obstacle.
- 3) Unwillingness to be catechized. Throughout my years at seminary, there was a constant exhortation driven home to us by all the profs: "Catechesis is the key! Teach your people! Teach your people!" It sounds great. And, indeed, it is exactly what is necessary. But, herein lies the problem: How do you catechize people who have no

desire to be catechized? We live in a day and age when Bible Study attendance is pathetically low on average. Here are some stats that should startle any and all Christians: About 75% of Americans claim to be Christian. That's great, right? Not so much, since only about 20% of Americans attend Church on a regular basis (regular being defined as "at least once a month"). Less than 10% of Americans attend Church weekly. So, what about Bible Study attendance? Of those Christian congregations that offer a weekly Sunday Bible Study (around 35% of Christian congregations don't, by the way), less than 10% who attend Church also attend Bible Study. Less than 10%! That means that over 90% of those who attend Church do not attend Bible Study on any given Sunday where Bible Study is offered. Of course, who knows how accurate these statistics really are. You can go online and find all kinds of stats like these and they will vary from place to place. But, one thing is most definitely certain: The vast majority of those professing to be Christian neither attend Church nor Bible Study on a regular basis. The simple, and very sad, fact of the matter is that, in our day and age, people just don't take their faith very seriously anymore. Even the vast majority of those who take their faith seriously enough to attend Church on a regular basis do not see the need to delve further into God's Word by attending Bible Study. No wonder people swap congregations, and even denominations, like my friends and I used to swap baseball cards when I was a kid. They simply go where their itching ears are scratched and their own personal wants and desires are met. They don't choose congregations based on their faithfulness to God's Word. How can they? They don't know the Word. So, we can cry out, "Catechesis is the key!" till the cows come home, but it's pretty hard to catechize people who do not make themselves available to be catechized. This, by far, is the most frustrating thing 21st century Lutheran pastors face today. There are many faithful and brilliant pastors in our midst, but there are few genuine disciples who are willing to learn. Is there any doubt that we are living in the Last Days? I should add, though, before concluding this section, that we are very blessed here at Peace to have between 40-50% of our adults who attend Church stay for Bible Study on a regular basis, which is way above average. But, that percentage, while wonderful when compared against the overall average, should be higher, shouldn't it? I mean, barring physical restrictions or other obligations that must be met, is there a good reason or excuse to skip Bible Study? That's something those who don't attend need to prayerfully consider.

So, with those three obstacles (and there are surely many more we could add to the list), it is very difficult to accomplish a substantive reformation among us Lutherans today. But, that doesn't mean we throw in the towel. By no means! We press on. We teach those who will be taught. We preach the pure Gospel and administer the Sacraments according to Christ's institution. We slowly, but surely, reintroduce those customs and traditions our Lutheran Confessions, to which we claim to subscribe unconditionally as a congregation, say we religiously keep and defend. We do our best to celebrate the Mass with the highest reverence.

And, as difficult as it may be to accomplish a reformation among Lutherans today, make no mistake, my friends, a reformation is underway. More and more pastors and congregations in our synod are making a deliberate attempt to get back to our true Lutheran roots. The Lord's Supper is celebrated weekly by more congregations in our synod today than ever. Many congregations, like ours, are adding Feast Day Services, and deliberately attempting to celebrate the Mass with the highest reverence, bringing back many of the ancient customs and traditions which have been celebrated in the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church since her earliest days—customs and traditions like a) making the sign of the cross at the appropriate places in the liturgy, b) processing at the beginning of the Divine Service, c) bowing during the liturgy when the Triune God is mentioned, d) chanting the liturgy, e) bowing the head at the name of Jesus during the liturgy, f) elevating the consecrated Host and Chalice, and genuflecting before the very Present Christ in the Holy Supper, and so on.

We are Lutherans, my friends. At least, that's what we claim to be. We really should be who we say we are and do what we say we do. Shouldn't we? I mean, to claim to be Lutheran and not follow our Confessions, which define Lutheranism, is, at best, dishonest, and, at worst, deceptive. Dishonesty and deception are not virtues of the Christian faith. In fact, I'm quite certain that God frowns upon those things in His Holy Word.

So, the Lutheran Reformation of Lutheranism is well underway, as disturbingly ironic as that may sound. Who knows what will become of it. Only the Lord. But, we do well to participate in it, because, to borrow another line from that great theologian, Forrest Gump, "Lutheran is as Lutheran does."

"With Our Lord, There Is Always More!"

What follows is the Easter sermon written and preached by Rev. William Weedon, pastor at St. Paul Lutheran in Hamel, IL, this year. It is one of the best Easter sermons I have ever heard and I thought it would be a blessing to share it with you as we continue our celebration during this Easter Season. Enjoy!

In the Name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Alleluia! Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Today we mark yet another step in the unfathomable love of God for the human race. It was not enough for Him to have created us out of nothing in His image and to place us into the paradise of plenty. It was not enough for Him, when we fell into sin, to promise us a Savior. It was not enough for Him, to give us the Law to teach us our need of His mercy. It was not enough for Him, to send us prophets to call us to trust in Him and to turn from all that is death and vanity. It was not enough for Him to send His Son into our flesh. It was not enough for His Son to walk among us, a man among men, the only REAL man among all others who are really only failures at being men. It was not enough for our Lord to stand in the waters of the Jordan in solidarity with sinners. It was not enough for Him to reach out and touch and heal. It was not enough for Him to teach us the counsels of salvation. It was not even enough for Him to offer up His life a ransom for us upon Gologotha's stony slope. It was not enough for Him to share our graves and taste our death. It was not enough for Him. He would love us even more. And so the joys of THIS day.

For make no mistake about what THIS day celebrates. Not merely that a man was raised from the dead. This Man had raised others from the dead before - Jairus' little girl, the widow of Nain's son, Lazarus. But they were all brought back from death into life with still corruptible flesh. That is, they each finally grew sick and died yet again. I don't imagine that any of them faced death in the same way again - for they had encountered Him whose Word and call was stronger than death. But their coming back to life was not like what we celebrate today.

For THIS day we celebrate that human flesh, like unto our own, of a piece with us, has been raised from death in incorruption. He will never die again. He is forever beyond all that. As we like to sing: "Gone the nailing, gone the railing, gone the pleading, gone the cry, gone the sighing, gone the dying, what was loss lifted high."

This is the news that the Angel brought to the Mary's and Salome at the tomb: "You seek Jesus of Nazareth. He is not here. He is risen. Come, see the place where they laid Him, but go and tell His disciples and Peter that He is risen and goes before you into Galilee. There you will see Him just as He told you."

As He told you. His words of promise never fail. You can count on them when everything else around you is shaking, when your world crumbles, when your heart breaks, when your body fails. He will not fail you. It wasn't enough for Him to merely share our flesh and blood. Oh, no. He would have that flesh and blood glorified, raised in incorruption, shining with the light of deity, the very source of our eternal hope. And He will take that glorified flesh and blood and raise it to the right hand of the Father, bringing humanity at long last to that place where God had intended us to live from the beginning.

And do you see what His incorruption means to you? He, who is now forever beyond death, beyond sin, beyond the accusations of the law, beyond hell - He has joined you to Him. In your Baptism you went into that grave with Him and you came out with Him. Alive. One with Him. His life was given you there in the water to be your life - His INCORRUPTIBLE life. But with Him, that's never enough. There's always more.

And so He sends His servants out to proclaim His promises - promises that cannot fail, that are as sure and certain as His rising from that grave on this day in incorruption. Incorruptible promises to make you partakers of His divine nature. This is how St. Peter put it: "His divine power has granted to us all things that pertain to life and godliness, through the knowledge of him who called us to his own glory and excellence, by which he has granted us his precious and very great promises, so that through them you may become partakers of the divine nature, having escaped from the corruption that is in the world because of sinful desire." (2 Peter 1:3,4) The promises of the Incorruptible One impart to you incorruption and make you a sharer in His divine nature - so that all that He is by nature you become by grace. He, a child of God; You, a child of God; He, the Heir of the Father; You, the heir of the Father.

But with Him there is always more. It was not enough for Him to baptize you into His own indestructible life; not enough for Him to arrange for His promises to be spoken to you to impart to you incorruption through faith. He goes further; He has more; His love knows no limit. He has a meal for you. He wants to put into you, into your corruptible, dying, sinful bodies His incorruptible, undying, sinless Body and Blood for your forgiveness and for you life. He wants to unite you to Himself; to strengthen the bonds of your faith; to comfort you; to hold and still you in all your anxieties and fears. He wants you to know that just as death was not the end of Him, so it will NEVER be the end of you. He wants you to rejoice that YOU have a life that is stronger than all the death in this world.

Old Job could go to his grave in the confidence that his Redeemer lived, and that on the other side of the corruption - yes, though his body be destroyed - yet he would live again in this flesh and his eyes and none other would behold God. And as he thought of it, his heart burned within him.

We see more than Job. For we have known the Redeemer for whom he waited, and we know His triumph over death and the grave. We know that not a single word of His ever proves false.

So, beloved, since Christ our Passover Lamb has been sacrificed, let us keep the feast. Away with the corruptible leavened bread of malice! Away with the corruptible leavened bread of evil! Let us welcome the incorruptible unleavened bread of sincerity and truth: the sincerity that is God's earnest promise and the truth that with our God and His love for us, nothing was good enough until He had made our nature incorruptible in His Son and united us to Him that we might live in Him forevermore. This is God's sincerity. This is God's truth. This is the Bread on which we feast this day - the incorruptible bread that is Christ our Passover Lamb to whom be

glory with His Father and the Holy Spirit - the only true God who has loved us with a love immeasurable, deep, divine. Amen.

"Out of the Mouth of an Ass"


Palm Sunday—from the donkey's perspective (posted on Rev. Weedon's blog—www.weedon.blogspot.com)



Approval of Agenda

The agenda was amended to add three business items: Use of Fellowship Hall for Graduation Party, Health Insurance, and Crop/Garden. Motion made by Financial Secretary Miller, supported by President Brown to approve the agenda as amended. Motion carried unanimously.

Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes

Motion made by Treasurer Zeile, supported by Financial Secretary Miller to approve the minutes from March 3 as presented. Motion carried unanimously.

Report(s)


