## From the Desk of Pastor Messer "Getting the Sackcloth and Ashes Ready"

"While [Jesus] blessed them, he parted from them and was carried up into heaven" (Luke 24:51).

It's that time of year again; the time of year for Lutheran pastors to beg the people they serve to remember that the Feast of the Ascension of Our Lord Jesus Christ is a High Feast Day in the Church Year, right up there with Christmas and Easter, in the hope that they will show up for Divine Service on a Thursday evening. This never goes well. It always ends in sadness. It really doesn't matter how vigorous the Lutheran pastor is in his begging. He can talk about it until he's blue in the face, write articles about it in the congregation's newsletter, remind people one-on-one whenever he has the chance, but it still never goes well. Ten people might show up. Maybe fifteen. It would be a miracle to have twenty. Thirty or more? No chance.

People will show up on Christmas Eve, regardless of the day of the week upon which it falls. People show up in droves on Easter Sunday. But, Ascension Day? A few saints, but mostly crickets. Sad, that.

What makes it sad, leaving Lutheran pastors around the country to engage in a unified whiny weep-fest together after they return home from their Ascension Day Services, is that it simply must mean that Lutherans either a) don't know the importance of this High Feast Day, or b) don't really care about this High Feast Day.

So, this is where I would normally include a detailed article about why Ascension Day is important and why you, as a Christian, should attend Divine Service on this important day, if at all possible. But, given the dual factors that only three to five people actually read the newsletter and that including detailed articles in the past haven't been very effective, I'm going to skip it this year. You can go to our website and read articles from past years if you're interested. Or—and here's a novel idea—you could just come to the Divine Service on **Thursday, May 9 at 7:00 p.m.** Or not. Whatever. Either way, I'll have my sackcloth and ashes ready to join Lutheran pastors all over the country for the annual after-Ascension-Day-Service weep-fest. Can't break tradition, after all. <sup>(C)</sup>

## **Ceremonial Catechesis** Silence, Announcements, and "Amen"

#### **Silence**

I remember getting vested on Sunday, July 31, 2005 in what used to be the church office/overflow area, but is now the sacristy/vestry here at Peace. I was very nervous. I was about to lead the Divine Service for the very first time. The butterflies

were flitting about something fierce in my stomach. I was going through the Service in my mind over and over again, hoping that I wouldn't leave something out or mess something up. But, as I was going through this inner struggle in the minutes leading up to my pastoral debut, something kept distracting me: the noise coming from the nave. Wow, was it loud. Jokes were being told, producing robust laughter. People were talking about TV shows or events going in in their lives. It was loud in there. So loud that I could barely hear myself think, let alone pray. I remember thinking, in the midst of going through the Service in my mind, "We gotta change this."

And, we did. In pretty short fashion, too. Within a matter of a couple/few months, you could hear the sweet sound of silence in the nave before the Divine Service. That change came about simply by including a statement in our bulletin, which still appears in every Sunday bulletin to this day, teaching about this in Bible Study and mentioning it at meetings, and finally winning the "Battle of the Closed Doors," which consisted of me closing the doors to the nave before the Divine Service only to have someone else open them only to have me close them again only to have someone else open them, etc. until, finally, I stood by the doors, caught people opening them, and politely explained that I'd like to keep them closed. After explaining why, they understood and ceased opening them after I had closed them.

It may seem odd that I would include an article about silence in this Ceremonial Catechesis series, but it's really not. Silence itself is a ceremony and, as you've heard me say time and time again throughout this series, the purpose of ceremonies is to teach the faithful what they need to know about Christ.

Silence in the nave before Divine Service teaches the faithful that, when they enter the nave, they have entered our Lord's Holy House of Prayer. This is the time to "ponder nothing earthly minded," as the hymn stanza quoted above states. It is the time, rather, to prayerfully prepare for the Presence of the Lord and the reception of His Gifts. There is a time to joke around and fill each other in on things that have transpired in our lives during the past week, but this is not the time for that. This is a time for prayerful preparation; a time for meditation; a time to put earthly minded things aside. It is a time for silence.

You should use this silence, dear friends. It is given to you for a purpose. Use it to pray. Use it to meditate upon the fact that your Lord comes to you here in this Holy Place. Use it for self-examination. Use it to read through the readings printed in the bulletin or to read through the hymns we'll be singing during the Service. Use it to read through the "Christian Questions with Their Answers" prepared by Dr. Luther for those intending to go to the Sacrament in the hymnal, or to ponder the Introit (Psalm of the Day) in the bulletin. Or, just bask in the silence and allow your mind to be emptied. Whatever the case, however you use this silence, please do maintain it, so that your brothers and sisters in Christ gathered with you may use it as they wish, too. There is another noticeable place in the Divine Service where silence is ceremonially observed. It occurs right before the Confession of Sins. There is a rubric in the hymnal for this, which states, "Silence for reflection on God's Word and for self-examination." This silence is purposely included so that the saints gathered may do what that rubric states: Reflect on God's Word which they just heard (Divine Service 1: "If we say we have no sins, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. But, if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness"; Divine Service 3: "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth. I said, I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord, and You forgave the iniquity of my sin.") and examine themselves in light of that Word. This a time to consider your sinfulness and utter need of God's mercy and forgiveness. What sins are weighing most heavily upon you? What do you wish to be doing better in your Christian lives? Etc.

#### **Announcements**

I am not a big fan of including announcements before, during, or after the Divine Service. They always just seem so out of place to me. They're an unnecessary distraction. Do we really need to spend five minutes before, during, or after the Divine Service reading the very same announcements that are printed on the bulletin insert? Of course not. The congregation can read the announcements for themselves. And, if there is something in the printed announcements we'd like to highlight, or something we forgot to include in the announcements, we can make announcements in the fellowship hall while people are enjoying coffee. Better to interrupt our conversations for a minute or so than to interrupt the flow of the Divine Service, in my estimation.

So, we don't do announcements before, during, or after the Divine Service, and this is purposeful. From the Prelude (before Service music) to the Postlude (after Service music), we let the liturgy, the conversation between God and us, flow unhindered. You might say that we don't want to let the ceremony of including announcements distract us in any way from the ceremony of the Divine Service from beginning to end.

Having said that, there is nothing evil about including announcements before, during, or after the Divine Service. Many congregations have this tradition, and that's fine. Often, that tradition includes a welcome from the pastor, who says a few welcoming words to those gathered, makes a few announcements, and directs their attention to the Order of Service and Opening Hymn, after which the Divine Service begins (or something similar during or after the Divine Service). Fine. I'm not going to lose any sleep over it or anything, and neither should you.

What I will say, however, is that the arguments I've heard for the insistence of including announcements before, during, or after the Divine Service are unconvincing. The chief argument is that we need to make everyone feel at home, especially those guests who may be with us on a given Sunday. On the surface, this sounds like a fine sentiment, but, upon further reflection, it is misleading. It fails to recognize that, when we step through the doors to enter the nave, we're walking into the Lord's House, not our house. As such, it is a Holy Place, where reverence and awe are in order, which gets back to the silence mentioned in the first part of this article. It is very difficult to maintain that reverence and awe when the pastor or someone else stands before the congregation and talks about earthly matters related to the congregation with the intent of making everyone feel welcomed, at home, and relaxed. Often, the ceremony of including announcements is meant to be a sort of "ice-breaker," but what it almost always turns into is a "reverence-breaker," especially since the pastor or whoever else might be doing the welcoming and announcements will often deliberately say something witty or funny in the process. As I said above, it just seems out of place and an unnecessary distraction.

That is not to say that we shouldn't go out of our way to be welcoming and loving toward each other and to-

ward any guests among us. We most definitely should. But, there is a time and place for that. It can be done before or after the Divine Service in the fellowship hall, where it is perfectly fine to be relaxed and say witty and funny things, and to make people feel at home, etc. Please, by all means, if you notice guests among us, let them know how pleased we are that they've joined us. Invite them to sit and have a cup of coffee. Talk to them and try to get to know them. Be welcoming and loving. Invite them back. That's what Christians do.

#### "Amen"

The final portion of this month's article is sort of related to the previous section on announcements. The same philosophy that leads some pastors to see announcements as a good ceremony to employ is at work when they lead the Divine Service by announcing to the congregation everything that is about to happen throughout the liturgy. "Please turn in your hymnals to hymn so-and-so, as our opening hymn is . . ." "Please turn to page 151 in your hymnals, as we will now join together in invoking the Name of our Triune God and confessing our sins . . ." "We will now plead to our Lord for mercy in the Kyrie, which is found on page 152 . . ." and so forth. Every time I have encountered a pastor doing this throughout the Divine Service, I've just wanted to say, "Um, everything you're saying is right here in the bulletin. I can read!" Not only that, but Lutherans who are accustomed to using the historic liturgy found in our hymnals don't need to have their hands held and walked through every part of the liturgy. They know it. By heart. They use it week in and week out. They don't need to be told what's going to happen next; they already know. And, if there are guests, they can follow along with the bulletin. This is why we make our bulletins as detailed as they are, including every element of the liturgy, along with page numbers, just in case there are guests among us.

The same is true of the "Amen." The "Amen" is the congregation's word, and it is unfortunate when they are robbed of it by the pastor. "Amen" means "Yes, yes, it is so." It is the word the congregation speaks when their Lord speaks His promises to them through the mouth of the pastor. The pastor says, "In the Name of the Father and of the + Son and of the Holy Spirit," and the congregation says, "Amen." The pastor says, "I for-give you all your sins . . .," and the congregation says, "Amen." The pastor says, "The peace of the Lord be with you always," and the congregation says, "Amen." The pastor blesses those who have communed, and the congregation says, "Amen." And so forth. The pastor doesn't speak the "Amen," because it's not his word to speak. It is the congregation's word. The pastor speaks the Lord's Words of promise and the congregation acknowledges those Words of promise with their "Amen."

Think of it this way: The Lord speaks and it is so. He does not need to say, "Amen." His very Word is His "Amen," since His Word, when spoken, does what it says. During the Divine Service, the pastor serves *in persona Christi*, that is, "in the Person of Christ." That's why he's vested as he is, to cover the sinful man he is, since he is now serving in the stead and by the command of Jesus Christ. He doesn't speak his words before the congregation, but the Lord's Words, and those Words do what they say. Thus, he doesn't say, "Amen" after speaking the Lord's Words of promise, for speaking those very Words of Promise is "Amen" already. The congregation, the saints gathered together in the Name of their Lord, speak the "Amen," acknowledging that what the Lord just spoke to them through the mouth of the pastor is so.


Anyway, there's a little info on why we have preparatory silence, avoid announcements, and leave the "Amens" to the congregation. Nothing overly critical or too deep here, but there are good reasons for even these "lesser ceremonies," too.




