From the Desk of Pastor Messer "We Need More Butts in the Pews!"

The Special Voters' Assembly we held on Sunday, August 28, was, I believe, a wonderful example of the love and faithfulness with which our Lord has blessed our beloved congregation. It was a tough meeting, to be sure, for we were forced to take an honest look at our financial struggles and to consider the impact those struggles may have on our life together in the days to come. That's never easy, but it is required of us at times like this, and it is a painful reminder to us that we still live here in the "valley of the shadow of death," where struggles and suffering abound. This is why we Christians pray, "Come, Lord Jesus," for we long for the Day when the trials and tribulations we must face in this dead and dying world will be gone for good. Until then, we can expect to struggle. But, the love and faithfulness with which we are blessed was evidenced by the fact that we were able to express our concerns, opinions, and ideas related to our struggles to one another in love. There was no bickering or arguing or anger, but a wonderful give-and-take between brothers and sisters in Christ, all of whom are sincerely concerned for our future as a congregation and want to find a way to overcome our struggles faithfully. I pray that this same spirit of unity, peace, and love will accompany our future conversations related to these struggles.

I want to take some time in this article to address one of the concerns I heard raised during the meeting, which I've heard raised many times in the past, namely that "we need more butts in the pews." I certainly understand this sentiment. It would be wonderful to have the Lord's House packed every week and it is true that, if we had more people, we would probably have more income from offerings and may not be in the boat we're currently in financially (although not a guarantee). But, there is also a danger in thinking this way, for it almost always leads to asking the question, "What can WE do to get more butts in the pews?" And when we begin asking that question, we're heading into dangerous turf.

To avoid this danger, I'm going to say something that will probably sound shocking to some of you at first, but hopefully will make sense once you've heard me out: We do not NEED more butts in the pews!

I know, sounds crazy, doesn't it? Nevertheless, it is absolutely true. We do not need more butts in the pews. What we need is Jesus. Period. Jesus is all we need and, thankfully, He gives Himself to us via His Holy Word and Sacraments. In Jesus, we have ALL that we need, and if we never had a single more butt sit in our pews, we

would still have ALL that we ever need in Him. And, if we recognize that we have all that we need in Jesus, the thought of needing something else (anything else, including more butts in our pews) will be replaced with thankfulness and joy at having been given all that we need. How can we be thinking about what more we need when we have all that we need in Jesus? As we sing in that beautiful hymn:

What is the world to me With all its vaunted pleasure When You, and You alone, Lord Jesus, are my treasure!

That's more than a pretty hymn. That's our theology. That's what the New Man (the regenerated spirit) who lives inside of all of us who have been baptized into Christ believes. He is perfectly content with Jesus. Jesus is all that the New Man in us ever needs.

Unfortunately, we still have that nasty Old Adam within us, our sinful nature that only and always wants to satisfy its sinful desires. Old Adam is not interested in what he needs, but only what he wants. And, he's never content; he always wants more. If Old Adam wrote a hymn, it would go something like this:

What is Jesus to me
With all His heavenly pleasure
When you, and you alone,
O World, are my treasure!

Not as pretty a hymn, is it? But, the truth is that Old Adam has us singing his hymn more than any of us would care to admit. We are not content with Jesus. We poor, miserable, sinners want more. The New Man in us assures us that Jesus is all we need, but the Old Adam all too often convinces us otherwise.

The New Man in us would never say, "We need more butts in the pews!" It is the Old Adam in us that causes us to make such statements. And this is why making the statement is dangerous, for once you give Old Adam an inch, he'll take a mile. Once Old Adam convinces us that all of our problems would be solved and everything would be made right if we had more butts in the pews, he will do his best to lure us into believing that the whole "getting butts in the pews" enterprise is our doing, and that we should get busy doing it. In fact, if we allow Old Adam to take us this far, he will have little trouble convincing us that "getting butts in the pews" can be used as a measuring stick for our faithfulness. If we have lots of butts in the pews, we must be faithful; if we do not, we must be unfaithful. Old Adam is relentless like that. He will not stop until he has us believing that everything depends on us—not only our salvation, but the salvation of others. The New Man declares in return: Neither your salvation nor the salvation of others depends on you!

So, back to my crazy assertion: We do not NEED more butts in the pews. We have ALL that we need in Jesus. But, from this it does not follow that we should not DESIRE to have more butts in our pews. We should, and we do, for the New Man lives in us, and his will is one with God's will, which is that all people come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Don't miss the reason for our desire, dear friends. We do not desire more butts in our pews so that we can get more money and meet our budget, but because we share God's will that all be saved. When the Old Adam has us looking at people as potential dollar signs, there is but one thing for us to do: Repent! For how sinful is it to look at people in such a way? No, we desire more people in our fellowship, because we desire their salvation.

"We NEED more butts in the pews" comes from the Old Adam; "We DESIRE more butts in the pews" comes from the New Man. And these are not the same thing; the two statements do not reveal a distinction without a difference, as many falsely

believe. They are as different as they are distinct, and maintaining not only the distinction, but also the difference, is necessary if we are to be faithful to what God teaches us in His Word as we address the question which must necessarily follow upon either of these statements, namely, "How can our need (wrong) or desire (right) to have more butts in our pews be fulfilled?"

The answer to this question is the same whether we ask it from the wrong or right motivation: Only by the grace of God. God alone is responsible for getting more butts in the pews. He alone creates and sustains faith. He has predestined all those whom He will call forth out of the darkness of this sinful world and bring into the light of Christ and His eternal kingdom. He has elected them before the foundation of the world was laid, and He will bring them into the light of Christ in His way and in His time, according to His will. God has things under control. Saving people is His business, and He knows what He's doing. And He has told us in His Word exactly how it is that He goes about His business of saving people, namely through the means of grace He Himself has established—His Holy Word and Sacraments.

The Old Adam doesn't like this arrangement at all. As mentioned above, he would have us believe that getting more butts in the pews and saving people is our business. And he has a couple of ready allies in the old evil foe and the sinful world, both of whom join Old Adam to tempt us into making this our business, rather than leaving this to God. You can even hear that ancient serpent's voice coming through in the temptations foisted upon us: "Did God really say that getting more butts in the pews and saving people is His business? Surely He meant that you must do your part first. How can God save people if you don't do your part and get people in the pews?" And if this doesn't work, he'll try to guilt us into making this our business: "Don't you care about the lost? There are people dying and going to hell every day and you are doing nothing to prevent this. What kind of Christian are you, anyway?" And the sinful world will further confirm the temptations of the Old Adam and the devil, saying, "If you are going to get your congregation to grow, you need to adopt the tried and true principles that work in the world. You need to view your congregation as a business, the Gospel as the product you're selling, and the unchurched people in your community as potential consumers. If you are going to reach these unchurched people, you need to repackage the Gospel in a way that is appealing to them, and we can show you exactly how to do that. Or, don't you care?"

To all of this, the New Man in us says, "Phooey! You are dead wrong Old Adam. You, too, devil. And, you three, world. This is God's work and He will accomplish it as He promises. He doesn't need our help. He can take care of things just fine. He knows what He's doing. His will be done. It is always best."

So, if the New Man is right, where does this leave us? That's the question, isn't it? The answer is provided in Acts, where we read, "And they devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers" (Acts 2:42). There is where our attention should be, not on getting more butts in the pews, but on being in the pews ourselves, where we are instructed in the Word of God (the apostles' teaching about Christ crucified and risen for us), sustained in the fellowship of believers (the fellowship we have with one another through our fellowship with our Triune God, into which we were brought when He placed His Divine Name upon us at Holy Baptism and brought us into His Divine Family), strengthened and preserved in the faith by the breaking of the bread (the reception of our Lord Jesus Christ's very Body and Blood in the Holy Supper), and where we bring our petitions to our Heavenly Father, by the Holy Spirit and in the Name of Jesus, the Father's Son, our Lord (praying for the whole people of God in Christ Jesus and for all people according to their needs). What do we do? We "abide in Jesus' Word." That's what His disciples do.

Our task as Christ's disciples is to abide in His Word. That's it. Remember, all we NEED is Jesus, and He gives Himself to us via His Holy Word and Sacraments, as we gather in His Name in the Divine Service to "devote ourselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers." My calling as your pastor is to serve you in Christ's stead and by His command, preaching to you the Law in its full severity and the Gospel in its full sweetness, and administering the Holy Sacraments according to Christ's administration, as a "steward of the mysteries of God" (1 Cor. 4:1).

My calling is not to "get more butts in the pews," but to "feed the flock" I have been called to serve by my Lord, Jesus (cf. John 21:15-19). Your calling as Christ's disciples is to avail yourselves of the preaching of His Word and reception of His Sacraments, that is, to "abide in Jesus' Word," so that you may "grow in the grace and knowledge of your Lord Jesus Christ" (2 Pet. 3:18).

But, what about all those passages that seem to be telling us that we need to be out in the world telling everyone about Jesus? Shouldn't we be "letting our lights shine" (Matt. 5:16) and "proclaiming the praises of Him who called us out of darkness and into His marvelous light" (1 Pet. 2:9)? Absolutely, we should! But, what are these passages, and the many others similar to them, calling for us to do? How do we let our lights shine and proclaim the praises of our Lord? We do so as we live out our faith in Christ as His disciples wherever He has placed us in our various vocations. We let our lights shine and proclaim His praises when we perform the duties of our vocations in this world with integrity, honor, and diligence, to the best of our ability, as Christ's disciples. Are you a parent? Take care of your children. Provide for them, discipline them, love them, and bring them up in the admonition of the Lord. Are you a teacher? Teach your students to the best of your ability. Care for them. Love them in such a way that you perform your duties with the desire that they learn. Are you a factory worker? Do the tasks your employer has given you to do to the best of your ability. Be on time, work hard, and show your boss the respect he deserves, even when you disagree with his management or believe he is expecting too much. And so forth. Where has God placed you in life? Wherever that is, serve to the best of your ability, as Christ's disciples, seeking to love God and to love your neighbor as you fulfill your duties. And, yes, when you are given the opportunity to confess your faith and to "make a defense for the hope that is in you" (cf. 1 Pet. 3:15), you do so, the Holy Spirit leading you. That's how you let your lights shine and proclaim His praises.

How this plays itself out in the context of a congregation is much the same. Rather than seeking to "get more butts in the pews," we should be focusing on loving God and neighbor by supporting His Ministry and Mission, helping the needy among us and in our community, praying for each other and those in our community, and so forth. In fact, if we continue reading that passage from Acts 2 mentioned above, we will find that this is exactly what the disciples who "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, the breaking of the bread and the prayers" were doing. They were filled with awe at the grace, mercy, and love their Savior had for them, and were moved by that grace, mercy, and love to share all that they had with each other and to provide for all in need. They praised God with their love for one another and their acts of mercy both within their fellowship and throughout their surrounding community, so that they had "favor with all the people." Sounds a lot like what our Lord Jesus said to His disciples in the upper room on the night when He was betrayed: "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another: just as I have loved you, you also are to love one another. By this all people will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another" (John 13:34-35). And, as the disciples who "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers" loved one another and extended the grace, mercy, and love they received from the Lord to others within their fellowship and community, we're told that "the Lord added to their number day by day those who were being saved" (Acts 2:47b).

Who added to their number? The Lord. And did He do so because they developed some dynamic evangelism program and went out into their community to try to get people to join their congregation? No. Did He add to their number because they had organized enticing "outreach programs" to draw people into their fellowship? No. Did He bring them growth because they were out there preaching about Jesus to everyone they met. No. They "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers," and, moved by the grace, mercy, and love they received from their Lord, they loved one another and showed love and mercy to all, and the Lord added to their number, in His way and in His time, according to His will. Do you see it?

Now, does all of this mean that we need to disband our Evangelism Committee (S.A.L.T.) and avoid holding any sort of outreach events? Not at all. It just means that our Evangelism Committee does not exist to find ways to "get more butts in

the pews," and the outreach events they might organize are not held for that purpose. Instead, our Evangelism Committee should seek to do what the name they've given themselves means: S.A.L.T—Sharing with All the Love and Truth of Jesus. Whether they organize inreach, outreach, or service events, the purpose is to share the love and truth of Jesus with each other and with others in our community, without expecting anything in return, but simply as they are motivated by the grace, mercy, and love of our Savior. Whether the Lord adds to our number is His business.

A good summary of what I have written here (and if you have continued reading to this point, God bless you!) is provided in the following quote from my good friend and brother in the Office, Pr. William Weedon, who shared these "Brief Thoughts on Witnessing" a while back on his blog (www.weedon.blogspot.com):

What I have come to rejoice in is this: Our Lord did not command, "Go, fish for men!" He rather promised, "Follow me and I will make you a fisher of men." He did not say: "Go, witness!" He promises, "Stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high and you will be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth." And He does make us so: fishers and witnesses. As we follow Him, as we seek to love Him and to love our neighbor, serving them and honoring them and opening our mouth whenever they ask us to account for the hope that is in us, the Lord actually has use of us in bringing others to faith. But He solidly keeps His hands on the verbs for conversion. Not only is it true that I cannot believe by myself; I cannot give faith to a single other person out there - no matter how clever I may be in my attempts. But I can love them, serve them, rejoice in them, and whenever they ask an account - open my mouth to declare this great joy in which we live with our sins forgiven, our death destroyed, secure in the love of a Savior who loves them, too, and did all this for them as well.

Have you ever been in a conversation where you had the distinct impression that the other person asked a question of you, but really wasn't listening, wasn't interested, and was only waiting to talk? How frustrating is that? And, yet, that's how we've made evangelism come off too often. What a different critter it is when our witness to the Savior comes as a result of genuine inquiry. And with no need to pressure the person - just to share with them the love that we have come to know and rejoice in and live from - and to assure them that it is for them as much as for us. I see that as the Lord's keeping His gracious promise to us - to make us fishers, to make us witnesses. Gift, not demand. Promise, not burden. Peace, not pressure.

I love the way Pr. Weedon ends his brief thoughts: "Gift, not demand. Promise, not burden. Peace, not pressure." Evangelism is not our business, but our Lord's. Does He use us in bringing others to faith? Sure. As we live out our Godgiven vocations in this dead and dying world, faithfully performing the duties we've been given to perform, loving and serving others as we are able, and always being ready to confess our faith when called upon to do so, our Lord will use us to accomplish His will. "For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Eph. 2:10). But, the burden of rounding up the elect and bringing them into the Kingdom is not ours, but God's. It is enough for us to "abide in His Word" and to strive to love God and neighbor as we journey through the wilderness of this sinful world. God can handle the rest!

So, do we NEED more butts in the pews? No. We have ALL we need in Jesus. Do we DESIRE more butts in the pews? Absolutely, for we share God's will that all people come to a saving knowledge of Jesus. How do we fulfill this desire? We don't. God does, in His way and in His time. What, then, are we to do? Devote ourselves "to the apostles' teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of the bread and the prayers" (i.e. "abide in His Word"), which will motivate and empower us to love and serve God, one another, and our neighbors in our surrounding community. 

Synopsis of August 28, 2011 Special Voters' Assembly

Call To Order & Opening Prayer

• President Brown called the meeting to order at 11:15am. Pastor Messer led congregation in prayer. 39 members were present.

Pastoral Concerns

- Pastor Messer expressed some pastoral concerns he has about the rumors and gossip circulating through the congregation concerning our financial crisis, the ideas being proposed to deal with it, and his intentions as our pastor, all of which were made known to him by concerned members. He indicated that some of the rumors and gossip have been instigated by former members of Peace, who transferred out a couple of years ago, and stated that, while he wishes those former members well and continues to pray for them, he believes it is wrong for current members to share the rumors and gossip initiated by former members, all of which are blatantly false, with other members of Peace. The specific rumors he addressed included:
 - He has placed himself on call lists and plans on leaving Pr. Messer made it clear that he is not on any call lists, has never placed himself on any call list, and has no intention of doing so. He shared that the only time he was on a call list was earlier this year when the members of St. Paul's in Manito, IL (where his good friend, Pr. Aloysius Majewski served before being called home by our Lord last December) notified him that they had placed him on their call list. He made it clear to the head elder, who contacted him, that he was perfectly content here at Peace and believed that this is where the Lord desired him to serve. Subsequently, St. Paul's in Manito, IL did not call Pr. Messer, but another pastor they had on their list. Pr. Messer stated that he has no desire to leave Peace and would be perfectly happy to remain at Peace for his entire ministry, should the Lord will it.
 - <u>He doesn't visit the shut-ins and hospitalized</u> Pr. Messer made it clear that this rumor, which was begun by disgruntled members a couple of years ago, but still manages somehow to resurface, is blatantly false. He takes seriously his call to serve our shut-in and hospitalized brothers and sisters in Christ, and does so regularly.
 - He is motivated by greed Pr. Messer stated that if he cared about money, he would have never left Ford's to pursue becoming a pastor. He shared how he entered seminary with no debt and an excellent credit rating, but left with massive debt and a destroyed credit rating, which is sadly the case with many pastors in our synod to-day. He shared some of the history surrounding past financial decisions made by the congregation (e.g. selling of the parsonage; his raise in 2007; the 2009 loan the congregation gave him, etc.) and gave his perspective on those decisions. Unfortunately, because of Pr. Messer's financial struggles, which will increase in the near future as he will soon have to start paying on some of the debts he has been able to put on hold until now, he will struggle to support his family even if the congregation was to continue paying him his current salary, and will not be able to do so if his salary must be decreased.
 - Ideas about how to use the money the congregation would acquire from selling its excess land Pr. Messer shared that the three main ideas that had been discussed at Council included: 1) Pay off his debt and decrease his salary; 2) Buy pastor's home and convert it into a parsonage; 3) Invest the money and use some of it as an endowment fund to supplement our income from offerings. Pr. Messer stated that the idea of paying off his debt and reducing his salary was instigated by him, and his motivation for this idea was solely to provide a solution that would enable him to continue serving as our full-time pastor while taking a reduction in salary that would make the congregation's budget sustainable.

Financial Situation

- Pr. Messer stated that God's Word makes it clear that the church is not a business, and that the congregation needs to keep this in mind as it proceeds in addressing the financial situation. He read the Parable of the Talents (Matt. 25:14-30) and the commentary found in the study notes of The Lutheran Study Bible. Everything we have, both as individual Christians and as a congregation of Christians, belongs to our Lord, and we are merely stewards of His gifts to us. As our Lord teaches us in this parable, we are to put His blessings to use in serving Him and His kingdom, and not to hoard it away.
- Pr. Messer stated that he believes the time has come for the congregation to address our financial struggles, which means passing a budget for 2012 that we can actually meet (if we continue on our current trend, we will be out of money by next July). Based on the projected income for 2011, which is \$94,560, and the 2011 budget, which is \$109,565, we need to eliminate \$15,000 from our budget in the coming year. The only line items in our budget left to cut are the salary/benefits line items. This means that the congregation will have no choice but to significantly reduce Pr. Messer's salary for next year. This also means that Pr. Messer will have to get a second job to support his family, which means that he will have to become a part-time pastor, no longer available to us 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and this will undoubtedly impact some of the additional opportunities members currently have to be in the Word, both in worship and study.
 - Some members expressed their concerns about this, stating their wish that members would consider giving more to avoid this from happening, but Pr. Messer (and others) explained that, while everyone should always be analyzing their giving and seeking to give more, the congregation is simply not in a position to hope that this will happen, and needs to move forward based on the reality of our income and expenses.
 - Pr. Messer stated that, while he is willing to take on a second job for the time being to keep the congregation going, he fears that the congregation might become complacent with this arrangement and expect it to continue into the future. If that happened, he stated that, while he has no desire to leave Peace, he would be more prone to take a call to serve elsewhere as a full-time pastor. Pr. Messer also mentioned that if the congregation decided to sell the excess land and was successful in doing so, he hoped that the congregation would use some of the proceeds in some way to get back to being a full-time congregation with a full-time pastor.
- During the course of the discussion, some members expressed their interest in getting the Budget and Finance Committee going again to assist the congregation as it seeks to address our financial situation. Those interested were directed to see President Chris Brown after the meeting.

Selling our Excess Land

• Pr. Messer turned the meeting over to Larry Elliott, who led the congregation in a discussion over whether or not we want to sell our excess land. He explained that we currently use 1.7 acres, but would be keeping 2.47 acres and selling the excess 4.0 acres, which is an L-shaped piece of land consisting of property behind us (north) and beside us (east). That 4.0 acres was appraised at \$435,000 in the appraisal paid for by the hospital. Larry and Ken Hill met with the hospital and they are no longer interested in purchasing that land. Larry shared that the investment manager who owns land behind us might be interested, but would not discuss things until they had a price. After a little discussion, Gary Miller made a motion to list the property for sale, seconded by Miguel Ortiz. A friendly amendment was offered by Carol Zeile and seconded by Jo Wendt. The friendly amendment was accepted by Gary Miller and the final motion was to pursue selling the land first to other interested parties before listing the property. Motion passed unanimously. Mary Girard made a motion to have our asking price start at \$450,000, seconded by Carol Zeile. Motion passed unanimously.




