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From the Desk of Pastor Messer "Subject to None, yet Subject to All"

If you have never read Martin Luther's *On the Freedom of a Christian*, I highly recommend that you instantly stop what you're doing, get a copy, and read it. Okay, so maybe that's a bit much to ask, but you really should give this little treatise by Dr. Luther a read, since he does a masterful job of handling that timeless struggle endured by

all Lutherans, who, on the one hand, rightly confess that good works profit nothing toward our salvation, but, on the other hand, rightly confess that good works are necessary all the same.

Dr. Luther begins his treatise by stating:

A Christian is the freest lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, subject to all.

On the surface, these two statements seem contradictory. How can a Christian be simultaneously subject to none and subject to all? The answer to that question, according to Dr. Luther, flows from the understanding of another apparent contradiction regarding the nature of the Christian, namely that a Christians is *simul iustus et peccator*, that is, simultaneously just (righteous; a saint) and sinful (unrighteous; a sinner). Or, as you learned it in Dr. Luther's *Small Catechism*, Christians are made up of an Old Adam (sinful flesh) and a New Man (regenerated spirit). For as long as Christians dwell in this sinful world, the Old Adam remains in them, waging war against the New Man they've been given through Holy Spiritwrought faith in Christ. This makes the Christian life a constant struggle. Far from being a blessed, happy life, free from trials and tribulations, which many a false prophet on the scene today teaches, the Christian life is an ongoing war, which is fought internally, as the Old Adam and New Man daily duke it out for control of the Christian.

That's all well and good, you say. You've heard all that before. But, there is a danger here, O Christian, and that danger is in treating all of this as though it were nothing more than abstract, theological mumbo-jumbo; as if none of it really means anything concrete to you as you live your life in this vale of tears. That's why I heartily recommend that you give Dr. Luther's treatise a read, since he will show you how all of this should have a significant impact on how you live your life in this world as a Christian.

A Christian is the freest lord of all, subject to none, according to the New Man, which is given to the Christian purely by grace when the Holy Spirit works faith in Jesus Christ, through the Word of God. The New Man in the Christian is perfect, 100% righteous, in need of absolutely no improvement. The New Man in the Christian is perfectly holy and in perfect communion with the will of God. The New Man in the Christian always and only wants to do, and does, the will of God. The

New Man in the Christian is perfectly obedient to God. Thus, the New Man in the Christian is the freest lord of all, for he lives and reigns with Christ Himself. The New Man in the Christian is subject to none; the Law does not apply to the New Man, for the New Man is perfect. And, because the New Man is perfect, he need not be exhorted to do a single good work, for all that the New Man does is good.

Dr. Luther concludes this section of his treatise by saying, "Let this be said concerning the inward man, concerning his liberty, and concerning the chief righteousness of faith, which has need of neither laws nor good works. They are even harmful to it, if anyone presumes to be justified by them."

But, then he goes on to write this to introduce the second part of his treatise, which is vitally important, so pay attention, dear Christian:

"Now let us turn to the second part, to the outward man. For here we shall give an answer to all those who take offense at the Word of faith. At what has been said, they say, 'If faith does everything and is enough for righteousness on its own, then why are good works commanded? We therefore shall remain idle and do no works, being content with faith.' I reply: Not so, godless men, not so. That would really be the case, to be sure, if we were thoroughly and completely inward and spiritual. That will not happen until the last day of the resurrection of the dead. As long as we live in the flesh, we are doing nothing but beginning and making progress in that which shall be completed in the life to come. On account of that, the apostle in Romans 8:23 calls what we have in this life the firstfruits of the Spirit. For we shall have the tithes and the fullness of the Spirit in the future. To this part relates what has been stated above, that the Christian is the servant of all and subject to all. For in that part in which he is free, he does no works. But in that part in which he is a servant, he does all works" (emphases mine).

Everything that was summarized about the New Man above is the complete opposite of what pertains to the Old Adam. The Old Adam in the Christian is sinful, 100% unrighteous, in need of constant chastisement. The Old Adam in the Christian never wants to do, and never does, the will of God. The Old Adam in the Christian is not in communion with God, but with the devil. The Old Adam in the Christian is greedy and selfish, caring only for his own wants and desires. Thus, the Old Adam in the Christian is in constant need of the Law and the exhortation to do good works.

Again, the danger here for us is to treat all of this as just so much theological mumbo-jumbo. We shouldn't. It's not. The other danger here for us is to just throw up our hands and say, "I can't do anything about this dual reality within me, so why bother trying?" That's not true, either. As Dr. Luther notes in the quote above, the only way that would be true is "if we were thoroughly and completely inward and spiritual," which is something that won't happen "until the last day." But, here we are, still in the flesh and still in this sinful world, and because of that, we need the Law and the exhortation to do good works. We need to continually strive to discipline ourselves, subdue our bodies, and crucify our flesh with all its sinful desires.

"Good works do not make a good man, but a good man does good works, even as bad works do not make a bad man, but a bad man does bad works." Without Christ, we can do no good thing. But, we do have Christ. We've been baptized into His death and resurrection. We've been covered in His blood, declared perfectly holy and righteous for His sake. We are forgiven of all sin each time we confess and receive the Holy Absolution, and each time we partake of Christ's very body and blood in the Holy Supper. We have Christ, and with Him, we do have the power to subdue our flesh and do good works.

But, you immediately answer: Yes, but we remain sinners, and the ability to subdue our flesh and do good works is severely limited by this fact. Yes, yes, it is. But, this is no reason to throw in the towel, is it? If a drowning man is rescued by another man who throws him a life preserver, how absurd would it be for him to purposely jump back in the water in the hope of being rescued again? No, that man, once safely on the boat, would give ample thanks to the man who rescued him and do his sound best to avoid falling in the water again.

So it should be with the Christian. You have been rescued by Christ. You are saved. You have been safely brought into the Ark of Christ's Church, whisked out of the drowning waters of this sinful world. Will you purposely and intentionally jump back into those waters? Will you dare Christ to rescue you time and time again? How foolish would that be? No, a Christian must strive to stay safely in the Ark of Christ's Church.

The Good News-the fantastic and unbelievable, except through Holy Spirit-wrought faith, Good News-is that

Christ always stands at the ready to throw you the life preserver of His Holy and Saving Word and Sacraments, so that when you do inevitably fall into the drowning waters of this sinful world, He is there to rescue you time and time again. But, again, it does not follow from this that you would purposely and intentionally jump into those drowning waters and dare Christ to save you. To do so would be to treat Christ's work of salvation as a mockery; to spit upon Him, scourge Him, and crucify Him anew.

No, dear Christian, while you are the freest lord of all, subject to none, you remain the most dutiful servant of all, subject to all, in this life. You are free in Christ, already made perfect by being clothed in His holiness and righteousness. The Law does not apply to you. It's been fulfilled by Christ. Good works do not apply to you. You have all the good works you need, for you have the perfect works of Jesus credited to you. You cannot improve upon perfection and, in Christ, you are perfect. But, that perfection, already yours through faith in Christ, is not yet realized. You're still in the flesh. Your Old Adam remains, which means you still need to hear the Law. You still need to be exhorted to do good works. You need to fight, to strive, to wage war against your flesh, seeking to give the New Man in you the upper hand in his daily brawl with the Old Adam. So, you pray. You hear the Word. You receive the Sacraments. You are lead to repentance by the Holy Spirit through the preaching of the Law, and to faith in Christ by the same Holy Spirit through the preaching of the Gospel, which assures you that all your sins are forgiven, and that you have eternal life and everlasting salvation, through Jesus Christ. And, motivated by that precious Gospel, you love and serve God and neighbor.

Do you see it? A Christian is not idle. Christianity is not a mere belief system; it is a way of life. It is no coincidence that Christianity was first referred to as "The Way." As Dr. Luther famously put it, "We are saved by faith alone, but faith is never alone. Faith is a living, busy, active, mighty thing." Faith works. Faith strives. Faith does. Faith does not sit idly by and bask in itself. Faith lives and breathes and loves and works. Faith doesn't ask, "Do I have to do good works?" Faith just does them. Good works flow from living and active faith.

So, there is an order. First, faith. Then, love. Finally, works. Always in that order. Faith must come first, for without faith, there can be no God-pleasing love or works. And, the love and works that flow from faith have nothing to do with your salvation, for your salvation is already secured. Neither are they directed toward God, for He doesn't need them. The love and works that flow from faith are for your neighbors, the people our Lord puts into your path as you live out your various vocations in this world.


And that faith, dear friends, needs to be fed and nourished and exercised and disciplined. For without such, it can easily wither up and die. Thus, the need in all of this for the continual refreshment that comes from the Holy Word and Sacraments. "Your Word is a lamp to my feet, [O Lord], and a light to my path" (Ps. 119:105). Christians live to and from the Word of God; to and from the baptismal font; to and from the pulpit; to and from the holy altar, where they receive the very Body and Blood of the Word of God Himself, and are strengthened and preserved in the faith—the faith that lives and breathes and loves and works.

As I said at the onset, if you haven't read Dr. Luther's *On the Freedom of a Christian*, you really should. He has much more to say than what I've summarized here. His treatise is every bit as applicable today as when he penned it, and will help you to understand that all this talk about faith and works, the New Man and Old Adam, being subject to none and subject to all at the same time, is not just so much theological mumbo-jumbo, but the way of life for Christians. I'll let Dr. Luther have the last word:


"And so we conclude that a Christian does not live in himself, but in Christ and in his neighbor, or else he is not a Christian: in Christ through faith, in his neighbor through love. Through faith, he is caught up above himself into God. Through love, he sinks back down below himself into his neighbor, though always remaining in God and His love, as Christ says in John 1:51, 'Amen, I say to you, from now on you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man.'"

My Personal Relationship with Jesus (or, Why I Don't Need to Go to Church)

I've heard this reasoning given so many times by people who consider themselves Christians, but who don't go to church: "I have my own personal relationship with Jesus. I don't need to go to church."

Really? Can you point me to where that is taught in Holy Scripture? I mean, if this is true, then there's a whole lot of us wasting our time. If I can have my own personal relationship with Jesus, which frees me from having to join, or attend, a church, there's lots of other stuff I could do on Sunday mornings. Golf, for one. Yard work, for another. Or, just plain old sleeping in. That'd be cool. Please, point me to where this teaching is in Holy Scripture, that I might rid myself of this time-wasting activity of going to church.

What? You can't point me to where this is taught in Scripture? This is just what you believe, and you have no other basis for that belief other than your own personal opinion on the matter? Oh, well, in that case, I think I'll just keep going to church then. I mean, Jesus established His church, so He obviously seems to think it's pretty important. Not only that, but Jesus promises to be Present in His church. Not only that, but there is not a single promise given by Jesus to save sinners, or keep them saved, which is not connected to His church. Not only that, but Jesus, in fact, teaches against this "personal relationship" stuff, stating unequivocally that Christians belong to a communion, or fellowship. Not only that...

"Oh, really, smart guy! Why don't you show me in Holy Scripture where all of that is taught!"

Well, I wasn't finished. There's lots more I could say. But, since you asked, here's a few Scripture passages on the matter, in no particular order, off the top of my head: Heb. 10:24-25; Matt. 18:20; Prov. 27:17; Exod. 20:8; Heb. 13:17; Rom. 10:17; Acts 2:42; Ps. 133:1-3; Heb. 3:13; 1 Cor. 12:12; Rom. 12:1; Ps. 84:10; Ps. 11:1-7; 2 Tim. 3:16; Matt. 16:18; 1 Cor. 12:27; Matt. 18:19; Ps. 23; Matt. 28:18-20. Actually, I could simply respond by saying that the entire Bible, both Old and New Testaments, teaches the importance of being gathered together in the sacred assembly (congregation, church), where God Himself visits His people to teach them His Word, lead them to repentance and faith, and feed them upon His grace, mercy, and love. In fact, there's not a single instance anywhere in Scripture where God teaches, or condones, this idea of having a personal relationship with Him apart from the communion of saints, for our God is a God who locates Himself, and ...

"See, now I know you're wrong! God is omnipresent. He is everywhere!"

Again, you didn't let me finish. Yes, God is omnipresent. He is everywhere, but He is not everywhere "for you." He is not everywhere to save you. He is not everywhere to teach you and guide you. He is not everywhere to feed you and sustain you. He is not everywhere to bestow upon you His grace, mercy, and love. He is not everywhere to forgive you. He is not everywhere to give you life and salvation. He is not ...

"So, you put your God in a box? My god is bigger than that! My god is everywhere to save me."

Well, I don't know your god. I'm talking about the God who reveals Himself in Scripture; the God who put Himself in the "box" of our human flesh to live, die, and rise again for us; the God who continues to put Himself in the "box" of His Holy Word and Sacraments, revealing to us exactly where He is Present among us to save us; the God who locates Himself . . .

"I know what you're going to say. He locates Himself in His church, but I don't buy it. I have my own personal relationship with Jesus, and I don't need to go to church!"

Can you show me where that is taught in Scripture?...

Wednesdays at Peace

We are going to a different midweek schedule here at Peace, beginning on <u>Wednesday, September</u> <u>18</u>. There will be no Wednesday or Thursday activities on September 4-5 and 11-12, as I will be spending time with my mom (and family) prior to, and following, her surgery on September 5 (I will be here for Divine Service on Sunday, September 8, if all goes well with her surgery). As of Wednesday, September 18, we will go to the following schedule, which involves moving our Thursday Bible Study ("Together in the Word") to Wednesdays as well:

9:30 am—Matins 10:00 am—Bible Study 11:45 am—Sext 5:30 pm—Vespers 6:00 pm—Bible Study 7:00 pm—Divine Service 10:00 pm—Compline

This is a very similar schedule to what we have used during Advent and Lent the past couple of years, and the Services throughout the day will be very similar, too—all of them being short, spoken Services. There is absolutely no expectation on my part that members will be able to regularly attend all of these Services, but they will be there for those who can, and wish to, attend any of them. And, I already pray some of these daily Prayer Services on my own at home, so it won't bother me if I find myself alone at the church for any of them.

The schedule I'm working on for these Services will follow the Daily Lectionary, which is in our LSB hymnal (p. 299ff.), for Matins and Vespers each Wednesday. So, on Wednesday, September 18, the readings for Matins will be Gen. 1:1-19 and Mark 1:1-3, and we'll pick them up again at Vespers, reading Gen. 1:20-2:3 and Mark 1:14-28. Each Wednesday, we'll pick up where we left off the previous week.

Also, we are going to pray the entire Psalter (all 150 Psalms) in a year, as we're going to pray the Psalms in consecutive order during all four Prayer Services each Wednesday (e.g. September 18— Matins: Ps. 1; Sext: Ps. 2; Vespers: Ps. 3; Compline: Ps. 4). We'll divide up some of the longer Psalms along the way, but we'll make sure to pray them all each year. Each month, I'll publish the schedule of readings and psalms for the current and next month here in the newsletter, so that, even if you can't make it to the Services on Wednesdays, you can still pray along with us on your own.

Anyway, that's the plan. Wednesdays at Peace will be fully devoted to prayer and study, and you are invited to join in whenever your schedule permits.

Wednesdays at Peace Schedule of Readings and Psalms

This schedule of readings follows the Daily Lectionary in LSB (p. 299ff.), which is the same as that used in "Treasury of Daily Prayer." As you will note, some portions of the Old Testament readings are skipped, but the New Testament schedule will contain every verse. We will tweak the schedule in the hymnal in order to continue in a chronological fashion when the time comes (the Daily Lectionary jumps around, according to the season in the Church Year). The reading plan does not involve the Services of Sext and Compline, which have one or two short readings of their own, but they are included in our plan to pray the entire Psalter in a year, as indicated in the schedule.
