From the Desk of Pastor Messer

"FOOTPRINTS IN THE SAND" OR PSALM 23?

A few weeks ago, during our Thursday morning Bible Study, *Together in the Word*, I pointed out that I'm not a big fan of the popular poem, "Footprints in the Sand." Those in attendance were stunned to hear me say that and rightly demanded that I explain what I could possibly have against this beautiful poem.

My initial thought was, "Uh oh, what have I gotten myself into here?" But, shaking that off, I went on to explain that my beef with "Footprints" is that it really doesn't say much, and what it does say does not agree with Holy Scripture. On the surface, it may seem like a nice, harmless, sentimental poem, which pulls on our heartstrings. But, digging deeper, what does it really say? Let's look at the poem and find out:

Footprints in the Sand (Note: There are a few different versions of the poem, but this version seems to be the most popular)

One night a man had a dream. He dreamed He was walking along the beach with the Lord. Across the sky flashed scenes from His life. For each scene He noticed two sets of footprints in the sand. One belonging to Him and the other to the Lord.

When the last scene of His life flashed before Him, he looked back at the footprints in the sand. He noticed that many times along the path of His life there was only one set of footprints. He also noticed that it happened at the very lowest and saddest times of His life.

This really bothered Him and He questioned the Lord about it.

"Lord you said that once I decided to follow you, you'd walk with me all the way. But I have noticed that during the most troublesome times in my life there is only one set of footprints.

I don't understand why when I needed you most you would leave me."

The Lord replied, "My precious, precious child, I Love you and I would never leave you! During your times of trial and suffering when you see only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

First, to be fair, we must recognize that this is just a poem reflecting the thoughts of its author. It is not meant to be deeply theological. But, still, given its widespread popularity, it behooves us to examine the poem's content against the background of our theology, which is derived solely from God's Holy Word.

The first question that comes to mind when reading the poem is, "Who is this 'Lord' to which the poet refers?" Now, you might reply, "Well, obviously, the author is referring to our Lord Jesus." Really? How is that obvious? The poet simply uses the generic "Lord" and leaves it up to the reader to identify which "Lord" is being referenced. What would prevent a Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, Jew, or even a Scientologist from using this poem in devotion to their "Lord"?

In fact, it is the generic nature of the poem which Carolyn Joyce Carty, who currently holds the U.S. Copyright on "Footprints" (although authorship of the poem is widely debated, which is why you will often see "Author Unknown" attached to the poem), praises as its finest attribute. She says that the poem "was written for humankind and those who have dedicated their lives in service of Faith from around the world." She goes on to say that the poem is useful to all who belong to the "Abrahamic Faith," including "Christians, Muslims, and Jews," and even to those beyond the "Abrahamic Faith," including "Buddhists, Hindus, and all others who call upon God by whatever name they choose."

What Carty lauds as the poem's finest attribute is actually it's worst attribute. The poem's generic nature fails to confess the truth that Jesus Christ alone is the way, the truth, and the life; no one comes to the Father, except by Him (cf. John 14:6).

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While Christians, Muslims, and Jews all trace their heritage back to Abraham, they do not share what Carty labels an "Abrahamic Faith," by which she means that they all worship the same God. Christians alone worship the God of Abraham; both Muslims and Jews worship a false god that does not exist (cf. John 8). Likewise, all other religions that worship a god other than the Triune God revealed to us in Holy Scripture worship no god at all.

So, the fact that one can simply substitute whatever "Lord" they happen to believe in into the poem is the first problem I have with it. There is only one Lord, and if a poem is written about that one Lord, it should mention His Name.

But, for the sake of argument, let's assume that the "Lord" referred to in the poem is Jesus. Are there any other problems with the poem? Unfortunately, there are.

Underlying the whole poem is the false theology known as "decision theology." This is the theology which teaches that the way we come to faith in Jesus Christ is by making the decision to accept Him as our personal Lord and Savior. Holy Scripture makes it vividly clear that we do not have the ability to make a decision to accept Jesus as Lord. We are conceived in sin (Ps. 51:5) and, by nature, we are spiritually blind (2 Cor. 4:1-4; 1 Cor. 2:14), spiritually dead (Eph. 2:1-5), and enemies of God (Rom. 5:6-10). Faith in Jesus Christ is a gift given to us by God (Eph. 2:8-10). This gift is delivered to us by the Holy Spirit through the Holy Word and Sacraments. Thus, we do not come to faith by our own decision, but we are brought to faith by God through the means of grace He Himself has established.

Keeping that in mind, look at what the man says to the Lord when he notices that there were scenes from his life when there were only one set of footprints in the sand: "Lord, you said that *once I decided to follow you*, you'd walk with me all the way." Bad theology! We do not choose Jesus; He chooses us. To make Jesus' walking with us dependent upon our decision to follow Him is not only false theology, but will inevitably lead to doubt and despair.

And, what about the idea that when times are good, there are two sets of footprints, but when times are bad, there is only one set of footprints, since the Lord carries us through those bad times? At first blush, this may sound all well and good. But, actually, it misses the mark badly.

It is not just through the bad times that our Lord carries us, dear friends. It is through both the good and the bad times. If we were given a vision of our lives like the one in the poem, the only times we would see two sets of footprints in the sand would be those times when we tried to run away from the Lord and He chased after us to pick

us up and bring us back into His fold. The rest of the time, we would see only one set of footprints, those of our Lord Jesus Christ, who carries us through the good times and the bad. To believe that Jesus only picks us up and carries us when we are experiencing trials and tribulations in this life is to misunderstand the reality that all of our life is lived in Him.

Besides all of that, the poem lacks any real substance. It is superficial and leaves it to the reader to determine why and how the Lord relates to the man throughout his life. Where does the Church fit in? Preaching? Repentance? Forgiveness? The Sacraments? You get the idea from the poem that the man and Jesus have their own thing going on, which is a popular notion in our individualistic society, but lacks Biblical foundation.

While it is true that each and every Christian has a personal, intimate relationship with Jesus Christ, that relationship is lived out within the fellowship of Christ's Holy Church. Christians are never in a relationship with Jesus all by themselves. The "Me and My Jesus" mentality that permeates American Christendom is blatantly false. It's not about you and Jesus, it's about Jesus and His Church, to which you belong.

For all of those reasons, and probably more, I am not a big fan of this poem. But, as I told the class that morning, that does not mean that I think everyone should go home and throw anything that has the "Footprints" poem on it away. I'm not going to start a "Ban the 'Footprints' Poem" movement or anything. I also fully realize that most people do not give things like the "Footprints" poem much thought. That they buy bookmarks, plaques, prints, etc. with poems like this on them does not mean that they have analyzed the poem's theology and endorse it, but rather that they found it inspirational after a cursory read. It's one of those "Oh, isn't that nice" occasions. And, that's fine, so long as these superficial, doctrinally deficient, "Oh, isn't that nice" things do not inform your theology and lead you astray.

After explaining all of this to the class that morning, I told them that what saddens me is that so many Christians put more stock in, and often find more inspiration in, things like this poem than they do in Holy Scripture. I then had all of them open their Bibles to Psalm 23, a poem that is truly inspirational and far more uplifting than "Footprints." Psalm 23 is real food for the soul, while "Footprints" is nothing more than cotton candy. Psalm 23 is substantive and deep, not superficial and shallow. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, Psalm 23 contains no false theology, but reveals the truth about the relationship between our Lord and those who belong to Him. When compared to "Footprints," Psalm 23 simply blows it away!

Let's take a look at this marvelous poem:

Psalm 23 A Psalm of David

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want.

He maketh me to lie down in green pastures:

he leadeth me beside the still waters.

He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death,

I will fear no evil: for thou art with me;

thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever. (KJV)

This beautiful and inspiring poem is all about what our Lord does for those who believe in Him; how He brings them into His fold and keeps them there. Let's take it verse by verse and uncover the depth of its riches.

The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want.

First of all, there is nothing generic about this poem. We don't have to figure out which "Lord" we're talking about here. The fact that the word "LORD" is in all caps indicates that the Divine Name is being used in Hebrew here: YHWH (Yahweh). This is the One and Only LORD of the universe, whose Name is Yahweh. This the LORD who created all things, and who came down from heaven and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the Virgin Mary and was made man. This is our Lord and Savior, Jesus, whose Name means, "Yahweh saves."

Our Lord is described as our Shepherd, which is a constant theme throughout Holy Scripture (cf. Ezek. 34; John 10). He calls us, His sheep, into His fold and provides for our every need; we shall not want for anything. He guides us, protects us, and feeds us. He leads and we follow. What beautiful and powerful imagery of the intimate relationship our Lord establishes and maintains with us. The rest of the Psalm reveals just how our Good Shepherd accomplishes this.

He maketh me to lie down in green pastures; he leadeth me beside the still waters.

The Lord, our Shepherd, brings us into the green pastures of His fold, which is His Holy Christian Church, where we feed on the rich food of His Holy Word. How does He bring us into these green pastures? He leads us beside the still waters of the Baptismal font.

So, unlike in "Footprints," there is no individualistic, "Me and My Jesus" mentality here. The Lord calls us into the fellowship of the green pastures of His Holy Church by baptizing us into His Holy family. The reason the poem is written in the 1st Person is because it can be prayed by all those who belong to the Shepherd's flock.

He restoreth my soul; he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

What happens at the still waters of the Baptismal font? We have our souls restored, for there in the water which flows from Christ's side, combined with His Holy Word, we are given the Holy Spirit, cleansed from all sin, and ushered into the fold of our Good Shepherd. We receive His Divine Name and are marked by the sign of His Holy Cross upon our foreheads and upon our hearts as those redeemed by Christ the Crucified. We are made new creatures, who from that point on, follow the voice of our Good Shepherd, going forth in His Name upon the paths of righteousness He lays before us.

Only those who have been brought into the green pastures of His Holy Church through the still waters of the Sacrament of Holy Baptism can walk in the paths of His righteousness, for only they have had their souls restored, and only they are clothed in the perfect holiness and righteousness of the One and Only Savior of the world, Jesus the Christ, Yahweh Incarnate.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

As our Good Shepherd sends us forth in His Name to follow in the paths of righteousness, we find ourselves in the midst of the sinful world, where evil reigns. The sinful world hates us because it hates our Shepherd. It seeks to persecute us, even as it persecuted and killed Him. We will most certainly face much trouble, pain, and suffering as we walk through this valley of the shadow of death, but we will fear no evil, for nothing, not even death itself, can separate us from the love of God which is lavished upon the sheep of the Good Shepherd.

Our Shepherd is with us always. He has promised us that He will never forsake us: "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the age." He comforts us with His rod and His staff. He uses His rod to ward of the wolves that want to devour us; those false teachers, empowered by Satan, who seek to lead us out of the green pastures of the Church and into the weed-ridden pastures of the world. He uses His staff, which is the Word of His Law and Gospel, to gather us in when we begin to go astray, so that we might remain in His grace, mercy, and love.

Thou preparest a table before me in the midst of mine enemies: thou anointest my head with oil; my cup runneth over.

Oh, but our Good Shepherd is not done with us! As He guides us in the paths of righteousness through the valley of the shadow of death, He feeds us along the way, to strengthen and preserve us in the true faith, unto life everlasting. How does He do this? By preparing a Table before us in the midst of our enemies.

This Table is none other than the Most Holy Sacrament of His very Body and Blood. Our Lord is not only our Good Shepherd, but also the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world, and the very Bread of Life, upon which His sheep feed. By partaking of our Lord's very Body and Blood in the Holy Eucharist, we, His sheep, are anointed, that is, consecrated, or made holy, for we receive His holiness and righteousness into ourselves, the same holiness and righteousness by which we were clothed at Baptism. We receive the pure, white garments of Christ's holiness and righteousness at Baptism, and we have those garments cleansed in His Blood each time we partake of the Holy Eucharist.

Truly, our cup runneth over, indeed! For our Lord does not just shepherd and guide us along the way, but makes His home within us via His Body and Blood, which we receive from the Table He sets before us. Our enemies may scoff at what we receive from this Holy Table, but they are powerless to take the Divine benefits we receive from it away from us.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I will dwell in the house of the LORD forever.

This concluding verse is akin to the Benediction (blessing) we receive each Lord's Day upon our departure from the Lord's Holy House. Because our Lord and Shepherd provides for our every need, we can rest assured that His goodness and mercy shall follow us all the days of our life, and that, when this earthly life comes to an end, we will dwell in the peace, comfort, and joy of His House for all eternity.

Of course, the goodness and mercy of our Lord and Shepherd, and the certainty of dwelling in His Holy House forever, belongs only to those who are continuously nurtured and fed by Him. This is why it is so vitally important that we attend Divine Service on a regular basis, for it is during the Divine Service that the Lord, our Shepherd, gathers His flock together and feeds them with His Holy Word and Sacraments, that they may be strengthened and preserved for the journey through this

valley of the shadow of death until they are finally called home to dwell eternally in His Holy House. To absent oneself from the place where the Shepherd cares for His flock is very dangerous. It is like a lamb straying away from the flock and traveling through the forests and fields by himself. The longer that lamb is out there on his own, away from the guidance and protection of his shepherd, the better the chances are that the wolves will get to him.

Some Concluding Thoughts

Psalm 23 is more than a nice poem. It is filled with substance and tells the real story of how our Lord cares for us throughout our lives. Every Christian should commit this Psalm, and its meaning, to memory. You want to be comforted, inspired, and uplifted? Psalm 23 does a far better job of accomplishing that than a superficial poem like "Footprints" ever could.


Notice, too, the stark differences between the underlying theology of the poems. Who it is that does the doing here in Psalm 23? It is the Lord, not us. No "decision theology" here! We don't decide to enter the Lord's green pastures; He makes us to lie down in them. We don't decide to come to the still waters; He leads us beside them. We don't decide to fix our souls; He restores them. We don't decide to follow in the paths of righteousness; He leads us in those paths for His Name's sake, that is, because we bear His Name. We don't decide to walk beside the Lord throughout our lives, turning to Him only when things go bad; He carries us throughout our lives, for He is with us always, and His rod and staff comfort us. We don't decide how to provide nourishment for our souls; He prepares a Table for us and feeds us on Himself.

Unlike a poem like "Footrpints," Psalm 23 does not just assure us that the Lord is there for us, but tells us exactly how the Lord is there for us. It lays forth a blueprint for the entire Christian life, beginning with the Lord, our Shepherd, calling us into the green pastures of His Holy Church through the Sacrament of Holy Baptism, and then guiding us in the paths of His righteousness, offering us protection and assurance as we tread through this sinful world, leading us to repentance and faith via His Holy Word of Law and Gospel, feeding and nourishing us with His Holy Body and Blood, sending us forth with His blessing and assurance that, when our life ends here on earth, we will dwell with Him forever in His Holy House.

So, "Footprints in the Sand" or Psalm 23? Is there any comparison? Seems like a no-brainer to me! ©

Reflections on the Eleventh Annual St. Michael's Liturgical Conference

I have been attending the St. Michael's Liturgical Conference annually now for six years. The conference originated out of Zion Lutheran in Detroit eleven years ago, but, due to the departure of Zion's pastor, it has been held at Redeemer Lutheran in Fort Wayne, IN, under the direction of Pastor David Petersen, for the past four years.

Each and every time I have attended this conference, I have been blessed immensely. It is just a one day conference, but there is a wealth of blessings packed into that one day. The conference, which was held on Monday, September 29, began with a beautiful and reverent Divine Service, which is

After lunch, we attended two workshops, gathered for a third time into the nave for Solemn Vespers, and then concluded the day with Gemütlichkeit, which is a time of fellowship.

What a grand and most blessed day! This year, I had the added pleasure of being accompanied by three of our elders (Bill Harmon, Terry Luplow, and Dave Zeile - Larry Elliott and Don Reithel were not able to attend). It was wonderful to have these men with me this year. They all shared how pleased they were that they came, and how impressed they were with the Services and the theological presentations. We also had the joy of staying overnight and visiting the seminary the next day. We attended Morning Prayer in the chapel, which is always beautiful. 


