

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many times during my time here at Peace. They are spoken in frustration by members who have had family and friends decline their many invitations to come to Church with them. I can sympathize with them. I have family and friends of my own whose ears are deaf to my pleas for them to go to Church. It is not only frustrating, but heartbreaking, for I know what they're missing. But, I learned long ago that I cannot do anything more than confess the faith to them, point them to where Jesus makes His presence among us in the Divine Service, and encourage them to go to where Jesus desires to give them His Divine Gifts. Oh, and I can do one more thing—I can pray for them, and I do. But, that's it. I cannot make them go to Church. I cannot make them understand how important it is for them to be fed and nourished with Christ Himself via the Holy Word and Sacraments. All I can do is confess and plant the seed; the rest is up to the Holy Spirit. He will harvest that seed when and where He pleases.

Of course, realizing this doesn't make it any less frustrating and heartbreaking. We want our family and friends to receive the grace, mercy, and peace we are blessed to receive. We worry about them. We want them to be with us in the Eternal Kingdom of Paradise restored, which will be ushered in when our Lord Jesus returns on the Last Day. And so, this often leads us to question ourselves: Have we done enough? Have we said the right things? Have we confessed the faith faithfully, or are we doing something wrong?

Now, there is certainly nothing at all wrong with examining ourselves to determine whether or not we're making the good confession faithfully. Perhaps we have been a little too overbearing toward our family and friends. Or, perhaps we have not been zealous enough in our approach. It is a difficult task in our day and age to find the right balance between speaking the truth in love and steering clear of pushing people away. Talking about religion, even with family and friends, is a tricky business. It has become a very touchy subject, along with politics. The unwritten rule is that we are welcome to discuss any subject freely and openly, so long as we don't bring up religion or politics. We can gab on and on about sports, the weather, popular television shows, or any number of other subjects, but not religion or politics. Those are viewed as too personal to discuss. And, for this reason, it may be that we're not guilty of being too overbearing or of not being zealous enough, but rather of refusing to confess the faith at all, in order to avoid conflict and maintain peace with those we care about.

So, yes, it is meet, right, and salutary to examine ourselves. But, we make a grave mistake if our self-examination leads us to conclude that the response of those with whom we confess the faith, whether positive or negative, is dependent upon how well, or poorly, we make our confession. As I said above, all we can do is confess and pray; the rest is up to the Holy Spirit. He works faith in whom He pleases, not us. He uses us to plant the seed, but it is not given to us to harvest that seed.

This is the mistake many pastors and congregations, even those within our own beloved synod, make. Like us, they experience the frustration and heartbreak of having people reject their invitation to come to where Jesus is present to gift them with forgiveness, life, and salvation in the Divine Service. And so, they set about to fix this problem themselves by repackaging the Gospel in a way that will better appeal to the masses. In doing so, they often end up turning the Church into nothing more than a social club, in which people have their "felt needs" met through a variety of programs. They also often end up replacing the means of grace our Lord Himself instituted in order to create and sustain faith in repentant sinners with their own creative and innovative means, which can be easily seen by what happens when they gather together on Sunday mornings. The Holy Liturgy is jettisoned for an hour of entertainment, replete with a "praise band" to entertain, and lead, those gathered in "giving their all for Jesus." The "worship leader" (i.e. pastor) removes his vestments, preaches "motivational messages," and goes out of his way to make sure everyone has a good time, being careful not to do or say anything that might offend those gathered. The idea behind making the Church and her worship "fun and exciting" is that we need to do something to get people to come.

But, we don't need to "do something"; we need only to be faithful and allow the Lord to do what He has promised to do. What is true of us as individual Christians when we confess the faith to others is also true of the Church at large—she is to confess the faith and pray; the rest is up to the Holy Spirit. When we, as individuals, or the Church at large, believe that it is up to us to come up with ways to bring people to faith and get them to Church, we make the same mistake Abram and Sarai made long ago (cf. Gen. 16ff.). Remember what they did? The Lord promised them that they would have a son, but when they did not see that promise coming to fruition, they took it upon themselves to help the Lord out, so to speak. Sarai gave Abram her maidservant, Hagar, and he lay with her and conceived a son, Ishmael. But, this was not the son the Lord had promised them, and, as we know, this plan to help the Lord out by Sarai and Abram did not bring happy results, but much heartache and suffering. Eventually, the Lord did fulfill His promise and sent them a son, Isaac. He is always faithful to His promises, as Sarai (Sarah) and Abram (Abraham) learned with much difficulty. They should have trusted in the Lord to deliver in His way and in His time rather than taking it upon themselves to help Him out.

The same is true of us, both as individual Christians and as the Church at large. It is not given to us to help the Lord out by coming up with our own creative and innovative means by which to reach people. The Lord simply calls us to be faithful to His Word and to trust in His promises. He doesn't need our help. He will save those whom He saves, with or without us. And He will do so in His time and in His way.

So, do not be discouraged, my friends. When and where the Holy Spirit gives you opportunity, keep confessing the faith to family and friends and keep inviting them to come to where Jesus is present for them. And, keep praying. That's all you can do; the rest is up to the Holy Spirit. He may harvest the seed you plant with your confession of the faith in word and deed immediately, many years from now, or not at all. That is not given you to know. You plant, He sows when and where He pleases. That's how it works. His ways are not our ways and His thoughts are not our thoughts. That doesn't ease the frustration and heartbreak we experience when those we love refuse to hear us. Such is life in this sinful world. But, the glorious Good News is that there is coming a Day when we shall never again experience that sort of frustration and heartbreak. Until then, we wait in patient hope and steadfast faith, returning time and time again to His Holy House to be strengthened and preserved in the faith through His Holy Word and Sacraments, that we might be His faithful witnesses in this dead and dying world, and that we might learn ever more to pray: Thy will be done.

All Saints' Day Homily Rev. William Weedon Pastor at St. Paul Lutheran in Hamel, IL Matt. 5:1-12 (Rev. 7:9-17; 1 John 3:1-3)

In this age, the Church is for the most part hidden. Wherever the Church gathers, you see only the tiniest fraction of her - and this holds even if thousands are gathered in one place for worship! For those thousands, let alone

hundreds, are only the visible part of the assembly that butts back into time at that particular spot and moment. But the Church isn't fractions. She's the lot, the whole assembly. And so she appears in Scripture mostly in Revelation, where John is blest to receive the vision of how it will be at the end, as the veil is lifted and everyone sees what truly is.

And so the Church shines in today's first reading: a great multitude, beyond numbering, and from every nation, tribe, people, and language. That's what we mean by saying "catholic" - from everywhere! And they are gathered as one people, standing before the throne of God and of the Lamb, clothed in white garments, palms of victory in their hands, and crying with a loud voice: "Salvation belongs to our God who sits upon the throne and to the Lamb!" That is, they confess with one voice that THEY didn't get themselves there. They were GOTTEN there by the One on the throne and the Lamb. And the elders and the living critters they all fall flat on their faces and worship God and they say the same: "Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever! Amen!" As John stares open mouthed at the spectacle - a mighty host raised up from the fallen race of mankind - he is suddenly catechized by one of the elders: "Who are these clothed in white? Where have they come from?"

John plays it safe. "Sir, you know." Comes the answer: "these are the ones coming out of the great tribulation. They have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb. THAT'S why they are before the throne of God and serve Him day and night in His temple. And He shelters them with His presence. They don't hunger and thirst anymore - they are satisfied. The sun and the heat can't get to them - for they live in the light of the glory of God. The Lamb in the midst of the throne is their Shepherd; He guides them to springs of living water - they drink the very fountain of deity - and God wipes away all their tears." All of which is to say: Behold, the Church as she truly is. Now hidden, but at last revealed in glory unutterable.

In our assemblies we participate in that one gathering of all the saints around the Throne, but for us it remains a gathering in faith - even though a reality - but in faith because we cannot SEE it yet. For now, we can only believe. But see it, we will.

That's what John spoke of in our epistle today. The reason the world does not know us as the children of God is that it didn't know Jesus as the Child of God, the Only-Son of His Father. Yet that is what we are, and our future glory has not yet even been revealed. We know with the full assurance of faith, that when He appears, when our Lord reveals Himself in glory from heaven at that Last Day, it will not only be HE who is revealed; WE will be revealed as well. We shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is - the Lamb whose blood has washed our robes and clothed us in His own holiness in the baptismal waters and who fed us constantly with

His Gospel promises and the Holy Eucharist. What we have believed and learned to live from here in this age, will be finally visible for all to see. And you will shine as He shines now. For you will be in that visible glory of the Church. To have this hope, this hope of appearing in the very glory of the Son of God, means that we work now on becoming whom He has made us to be. The hope of the glory that awaits, leads even now to a purification of one's self - no, you don't get the glory BEAUSE you purify yourself; you purify yourself BECAUSE you get the glory! So what you do in your body now matters. Because your body matters. It is even now, even from the moment of your Baptism joined to Christ and made His member, a temple of the Holy Spirit, and so in your body you seek to glorify the One who will at that Last Day glorify your body with His own glory.

The Church, then, lives in this now-and-not-yet-ness. Already by faith the coming age and glory are ours. And yet we cannot see them. We cannot see them in the Church's institutional life. We cannot see them in our own lives. We see instead quite a mess and failures galore. But the Church lives by faith. What truly IS, is what God declares and promises. So it is with the holiness of all the saints. It is not first and foremost a visible holiness in this age; it is a hidden holiness which only begins to peep through in this life, but which will shine without interruption in the age to come.

That now and not yetness shows up in the Beatitudes. Abram was promised a Seed who would bring blessing to all the families of the earth. Jesus is that blessed Seed, and as He sits down with His disciples at the beginning of their time with Him, He opens up that blessedness to them. The now of the blessing is the Kingdom of God, His righteous rule over their hearts and lives. It belongs even now to the poor in spirit - to those who know they have no claim on God - and who are persecuted for the righteousness that they hold to by faith. That's the first and last of the beatitudes. But still in the future are the rest of them: comfort for the mourning, inheriting the earth for the meek, being satisfied for those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, mercy for the merciful, the vision of God for the pure in heart, and the final acknowledgment that they are children of God for the peacemakers. Much lies ahead, and yet all is already ours in the Blessed One. We've seen how He has passed from death into eternal life - raised in the very body that bore our sins to death and was raised in incorruption, never to die again and made the source of incorruption for all who trust in Him, who receive His gifts in faith. He is the Guarantor of the Promise, the only Blessed One who bring us from the sufferings of this age into the unspeakable blessedness of the Age to come.

And here stands the Eucharist at the center of it all: here the Lamb in His glory, here the Lamb's blood that washes clean from sin, here the fountain of the waters of life that we drink and not thirst forever. Here the future given to us already in the present to be our life as we journey towards that unveiling. And so here the saints - all those who are wrapped in the white linen that is blood washed. We gather with them around the throne of God and of the Lamb to chant His praises. You can't be nearer to them any place on earth than here. The future world is here. Hidden, but present. But one day you WILL see it in all its splendor - the day YOU shine with the glory of Jesus Christ, to whom with His Father and the all-holy Spirit be honor and blessing, now in this age and unto the ages of ages! Amen.

"Witness: Before God and to the World" By LCMS President Matthew Harrison in *The Lutheran Witness (Oct. 2010)*

The Lutheran Reformation had been in full swing for nearly six years, but Martin Luther had yet to write his first hymn. A profound event moved his poetic and musical soul. Within a short period following, most of the hymns and liturgies he produced during his lifetime would gush forth in a flood of firm conviction and deep faith in Christ. What was the event?

Two young men, Augustinian brothers like Luther, were burned at the stake in Brussels on July 1, 1523 for preaching the Gospel of free forgiveness in Christ. They were the first "martyrs" of the Lutheran Reformation. Luther wrote a hymn in the popular ballad form of the day, used by the town criers of his day to deliver the latest news from village to village. Luther's ballad spread the news of these martyrs' deaths, as well as the precious Gospel for which they died.

The first right fitly John was named,
So rich he in God's favor;
His brother, Henry—one unblamed,
Whose salt lost not its savor.
From this world they are gone away,
The diadem they've gained;
Honest, like God's good children, they
For his word life disdained,
And have become his martyrs
(Luther's Works, 53:214).

The familiar term martyr comes from a Greek New Testament word often translated "witness." In its simplest (legal) use, a witness is merely one who recounts the facts observed (Matt. 18:16). Thus, it was crucial for the place of Judas among the Twelve to be filled with "a witness of the resurrection" (Acts 1:22), since the apostolic band was told by the risen Christ, "You shall be my witnesses . . . to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). John's Gospel and letters show a particular interest in such "bearing witness" (martyria)—an understandable fact since John was writing late in the first century as the eyewitnesses to the events surrounding Jesus were quickly passing into eternity.

Of John the Baptizer, the text says, "And there came a man sent from God by the name of John. This one came as a witness (martyrian) . . . that all might believe through him" (John 1:7). The text of John 1 is worth a careful read. What is John's testimony of Jesus? "This is the witness (martyria) of John . . . He confessed and did not deny, and he confessed, 'I am not the Christ'" (John 1:19–20). John called for repentance (John 1:23) and then pointed to Jesus with a witness so profound it has been repeated in the liturgy of the Church since at least the seventh century: "Behold, the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29). Finally, like Jesus, John the Baptizer sealed that witness with his own blood. How many faithful Christians have been safely guided to Jesus by John's witness? Countless millions.

The greatest witness, however, is not John, but Jesus Himself. Paul bids Timothy to "fight the good fight of faith, take hold of the eternal life for which you were called when you confessed the good confession before many witnesses." For, as Paul continues, "Jesus Christ Himself bore witness to Pontius Pilate in the good confession" (1 Tim. 6:12, 13).

Today the fundamental gift and task of the Lutheran Church is to bear witness to Jesus Christ—to His Gospel and all its facets (AC VII 2; FC EP X 7). This is our task toward each other. This is our task over against those who do not know Jesus. This is also the sacred vocation and ecumenical task of the Missouri Synod to world Christianity. We exist to bear witness—even to the point of suffering and death (and it may well come to that sooner than later here in the West)—to salvation by grace alone, through faith alone, on account of Christ alone. This Gospel is God's own testimony about Himself. This is the very confession of Christ Himself. This is the witness of the apostolic Church and the Church of all ages. This is the witness sealed by the blood of Jesus, the blood of John the Baptizer, and the burning of John and Henry, confessed and sung by Luther.

"Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses [such as Brothers John and Henry, Luther, John the Baptist, and especially Christ]...let us run with endurance the race that is set before us..." (Heb. 12:1).

- Pastor Pastor Messer presented the attached report. 
